## Pilgrimage For Youth

STOUFFVILLE — Linda Dafoe, auburn-haired grade 12 student of Stouffville District High School received the opportunity of a lifetime when she was selected by Mr. Duxbury, Mr. Mercer and ten other teachers as Delegate to observe the United Nations in action. All boys and girls between the ages of 16 and 17 were eligible for the honor, which is a part of the "Annual United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth," sponsored by the Oddfellows and Rebekah Lodges of America. The program is an outstanding experience available for teenagers for education in the knowledge of world affairs and international understanding.

Linda will travel to the World's Fair at Montreal and then on to New York. She will stay at the Sheraton Atlantic Hotel. All expenses are paid, except for personal items. She will listen to behind the scenes briefings on specialized U.N. agencies; she will witness councils in action, see business carried on in the five official languages of the U.N., make a guided tour of the U.N. buildings, have interviews at the headquarters of several U.N. nations, will be a guest at International House, will have two noon meals at the U.N. Delegates' Room, will visit the Radio City Music Hall, and will be offered educational bus tours and boat rides.

On her return home, she will have countless opportunities for telling about her experiences at the U.N. to school classes, church groups, assemblies and lodges that sponsored her. Obviously, Linda will have the summer of a lifetime and the dream of any student who desires to find out where humanity was, is, and is going.
