## Petition Council To Protect Crossing

VANDORF — The council of the Township of Whitchurch has approved the erection of automatic warning lights at a level C.N.R. crossing on the 6th concession, south of Cedar Valley.

The action was taken following the receipt of a 10-name petition submitted to Road Superintendent Ernest Davis.

Residents in the area had filed a similar request in 1966 but learned that insufficient funds had been

set aside in the budget to cover the cost. The crossing is located close to the Bosworth Potato Plant and the road is quite heavily travelled by both cars and trucks.

The expenditure has been estimated at about \$12,000. —The township's share will be about \$1,500.

Reeve Ross Farquharson said that it was council's policy to safeguard one level crossing each year in the municipality.

PICKERING — A Pickering Township ratepayer who came to a council meeting, Monday night to criticize the actions of the municipal police department, was forcibly removed from the chambers by an officer in attendance.

Reeve Clifford Laycox asked Police Chief Reginald Parker to escort Charles Morton from the building but Mr. Parker was unable to work his way through the throng of people present.

Detective Grant Hutchinson was standing close by and ushered the irate ratepayer from the hall. The meeting was temporarily adjourned by the reeve when the crowd became unruly.

Reeve Laycox informed Mr. Morton that complaints concerning police activities should be presented to the Commission and not to council. The speaker said that he had been refused a proper hearing. When this charge was denied by the reeve, Mr. Morton retaliated with verbal insults.

Later, when order was restored, the reeve allowed Mr. Morton to address the council again.

A recently enacted bylaw that makes it unlawful for a family to reside on a permanent basis in a summer cottage at Muselman's Lake may be put to the test in Whitchurch Township.

It was learned this week that a family, including six school-aged children, had moved into a cottage residence from the Township of Uxbridge. The owner has designated that the taxes go to the Separate School.

Transportation chairman, Wesley Brillinger said that time would be required to arrange transportation but he hoped to have this problem solved by the end of the week.

Trustees, at a meeting Monday night, have arranged that two of the children be admitted to Ballantrae, three to Bloomington and one to Ringwood.

## Floods Homes


STOUFFVILLE — A flash flood of both water and sewage inundated the basements of several Stouffville homes Sunday night, causing heavy damage.

At the residence of Frank Rowe, Main Street East, near the firehall, the water rose to a height of 4½ feet, flooding his furnace and burning out the motor.

In the area of Rose Avenue, Burkholder and Russell Streets, it was a back-up of sewerage that had basements and recreation rooms swimming in a sea of refuse. One Rose Avenue housewife said that a sump pump running continuously couldn't cope with the flow. "It came up through the floor like a fountain," she said.

She said that only for emergency assistance provided by fireman George Wilson, the situation would have been even worse. "The smell was terrible and we had no heat. We thought the town had a warning system to prevent this kind of thing."

Mr. Rowe said that town employees responded quickly to his call for assistance. "We feel they did their best but things were destroyed that can never be replaced."
