He said the \$2 per square foot charge was not sufficient, "It should be assessed on a comparable basis to what you and I are on. If this recommendation ever goes through, it would be a real shot in the arm for Pickering. "We are fortunate to have it here but not from an assessment point of view."

'AN ULTIMATUM'

Prof. LaBrie, a member of the Pickering Dist. High School Board, said that the teachers in Ontario were well organized and the trustees had little alternative but to give them what they wanted. "It amounts to an ultimatum," he said, "if you don't meet their requirements, you don't get teachers." He charged that local Boards were in a weak bargaining position. He said that - it was most unfair that teachers, good or bad, should receive the same salaries. He noted that some high school staff members were seeking up to \$20,000 per year. 
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
