Mr. William McAdam has charged that teachcr, Mrs. Wayne McNeil is incompetent and has asked that both the trustees and the Inspector investigate the situation. Mrs. McAdam has withdrawn her daughter from the Grade 5 class and says she will keep her at home 'even if it means going to jail'.

Board Chairman, Dr. Morris Smith took exception to discussions of a personal nature in public and finally called for an adjournment. When other members refused to support him, he walked out of the meeting. Trustee Norman Fockler took over forthe remainder of the session.
