In Stouffville Park

STOUFFVILLE — Eighteen public schools in the area have been invited to participate in a Centennial Track and Field Meet in the Stouffville Memorial Park. Organized by Stouffville Physical Education Instructor, Gary Grundy under the chairmanship of Keith Sutherland, it will be the first competition of its kind ever held here. A tentative date of Saturday, June 17 has been set.

Invitations have been sent out to the following schools: Shrubmount, Vandorf, Pine Orchard, Vivian, Lloyd, Hillcrest, Lemonville, Ballantrae, Bloomington, Lake Wilcox, Ringwood, Dickson's Hill, Claremont, Goodwood, Glasgow, St. Mark's Orchard Park and Summit View.

ANNUAL EVENT

Eight individual champions will be declared, four girls and four boys. Trophies will go to the top Juniors, age 9 to 10 (as of June 1); Intermediate, age 11 to 12; Senior 'A', age 13 to 14 and Senior 'B', 15 years and up. It is hoped that once started, the meet may become an annual event. Mr. Grundy is being assisted by staff teacher, Robert Stover of Summit View. Teachers from other participating schools will also help in setting up the program. A second meeting was held on Wednesday afternoon. All student entries must be submitted by June 12.

Included in the list of events will be a 1 mile relay for the boys and an 880 relay for the girls. There will also be a boy's open mile and a girl's open 880.

Due to major construction at the High School site, the meet must be held in the Park.

John F. Johnston Superintendent Of Education

The Hon. William G. Davis, Minister of Education, has announced the appointment of John F. Johnston as Superintendent of the East Central Area of the Ontario Department of Education. Formerly School Inspector for the Windsor Area, Mr. Johnston succeeds J. Frank Kinlin who was recently named Superintendent, Curriculum Division.

In his new capacity, Mr. Johnston will be responsible for the counties of York, Ontario, Durham and Victoria as well as the boroughs of Scarborough, North York and East York. He will carry on the experiment in new supervisory practices which has been under way in the area for the past year.

This experiment, which provides greater flexibility of department services, has met with enthusiastic response from local authorities.

Mr. Johnston was born in Peterborough and after graduating from that city's teachers' college began a career as an elementary school teacher which lasted for 10 years.

He then resumed his education, earning a B.A. from Queen's University and a high school teaching certificate from the Ontario College of Education.

In 1958, Mr. Johnston received his Master of Education degree from the University of Toronto, and then joined the Department of Education as a School Inspector in Windsor. In 1963, he was named Senior Inspector for the Windsor school system.
