## What Is The Biggest Complaint Against Car Dealers?

The business of selling cars may not have any more faults than any other industry, but they are surely better publicised.

Finding out what the buyers think is a continuing part of auto merchandising, but by the factors who conduct national studies and most dealers who question their own customers with direct mailings.

Approximately half the buyers questioned on a recent national survey were completely satisfied with their dealer! Of the remainder, the bulk of the complaints are connected with the standard of servicing.

One-quarter of all buyers said they would not recommend their dealer to others due to poor service after the sale. 44.2 per cent complained of warranty dissatisfaction and 30 per cent of inadequate pre-service of the new car.

Who is to blame? Apparently some car dealers who sell without regard to their customer's future service satisfaction. But there are two sides to the problem.

A hard-bargaining buyer who loses sight of all else but price cannot help but encourage a type of dealer who caters to his terms in order to make the sale.

If a low price alone is needed to win the buyer over, then the dealer may meet the buyer's price by short-changing him on service or some other part of the deal. The dealer will then have solved his problem of making the sale, but the customer's problems will have only begun.


