

July 1st Is 'Centennial Day' In Stouffville

STOUFFVILLE — Although several very successful centennial events have already been completed in Stouffville, and more are planned for the future, all things point to the weekend of July 1 and 2 as the most important occasion of the year. The program, in its entirety, will be published when all plans are finalized.

Saturday, July 1 will begin with a colorful parade at 10 a.m., to form up east of concession 10. The procession will move west down the Main Street to the C.N.R. tracks, then south on Blake Street to the Memorial Park. At the park, the floats will remain intact to enable camera bugs to obtain photographs. Boys and girls decorated bicycles and baby carriages will be judged and prizes will be awarded.

Parade chairman, Aurelia Smith told a Centennial Events Committee meeting Thursday that twenty float entries were already assured but more are welcome. Included in the procession will be Stouffville's Centennial Queen

and her attendants, also the Stouffville Dist. High School Queen, Margaret Sheridan and her escorts. The Parade Marshal is Fred Casile. A float, representing each Province, will be entered. Persons or organizations wishing to place further entries in the procession should contact Mrs. Walter Smith, Rose Avenue (640-3663).

Program committee chairman, Mrs. Linda McLean is lining up three separate shows, two in the afternoon and one in the evening. The entertainment is of a variety that will interest the children, teenagers and adults. There will be races and contests for the kiddies plus events at the Stouffville Pool. A centennial tournament is planned for the bowling green with fireworks and a monster dance at night.

At 2:30 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, July 2 a Centennial Worship Service will be conducted in the Park under the committee leadership of Mrs. Pat Kinsella. A choir of 125 voices is practicing regularly at

the Parkside Youth Centre. The Centennial Events Committee has approved the sum of \$500 to assist the Park Board in decorating the ground for the July 1 weekend. In addition, Main Street merchants propose to 'dress up' their windows and storefronts in keeping with the centennial occasion. Representatives of the business men have been invited

to attend the next meeting to finalize these plans. Store owners will also be asked to have their clerks gowned in centennial dress at a time to be designated by the reeve.

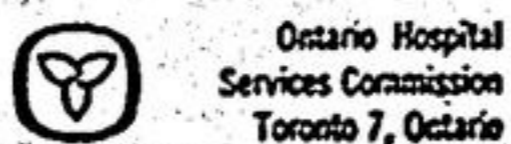

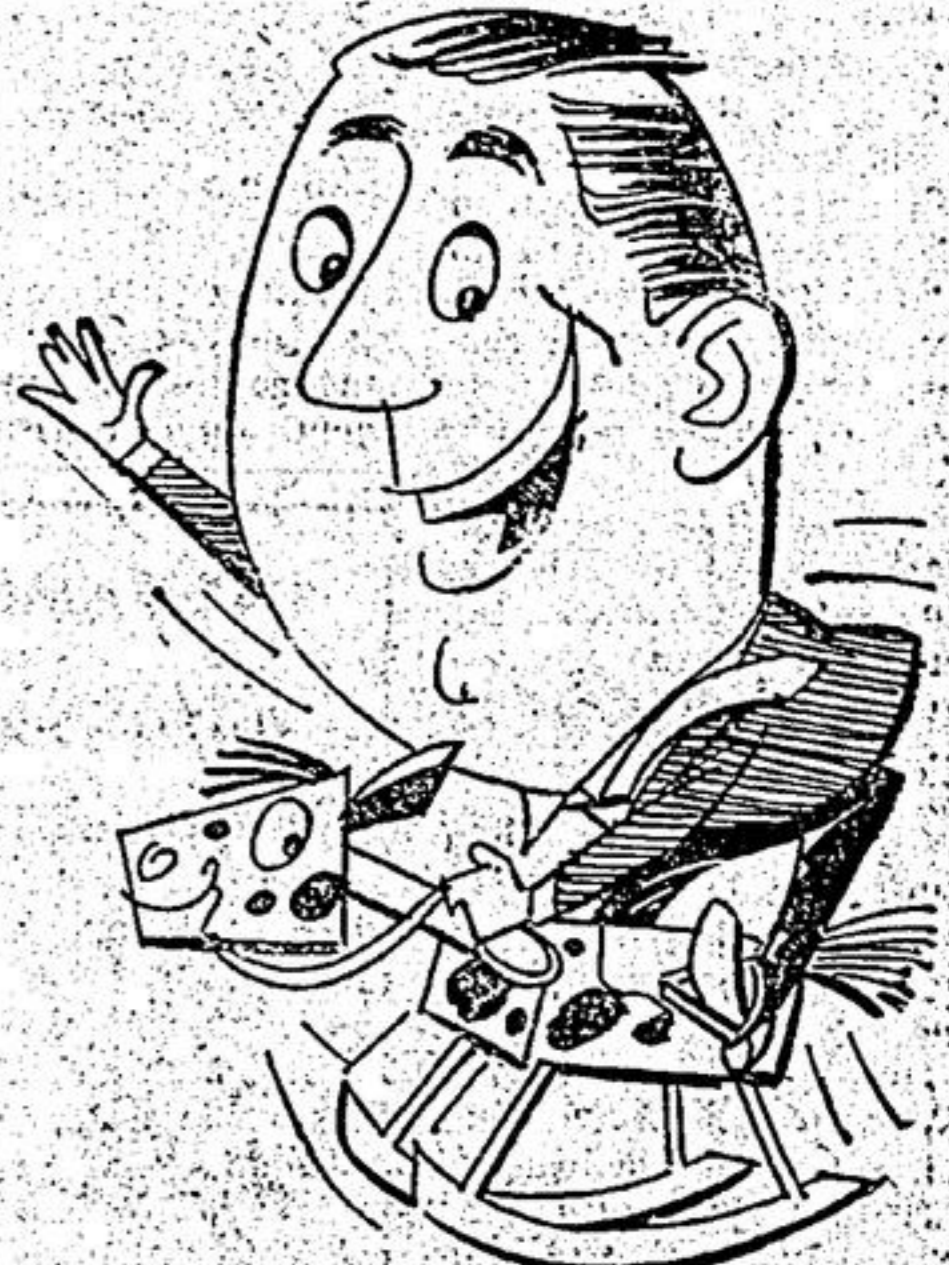
