### Art Show Coming To Pioneer Village

A display of more than 100 paintings and sketches depicting pioneer life as well as scenes of Black Creek Pioneer Village will be held at the pre-Confederation community during the period July 1-9 inclusive.

Black Creek Pioneer Village is located at Jane Street and Steeles Avenue in northwest Metro Toronto and is being developed by the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority as a typical pre-1867 crossroads community.

Between 10 and 12 regional art clubs and groups from King City, Unionville, Markham, Agincourt, Don Valley, Willowdale, Lansing and the Humber Valley will participate along with the Canadian Society of Painters and Water Colors.

The Art Show will be held in the Village's Dalziel (Dee-ell) Barn Museum. There will also be weekend demonstrations of pioneer arts and crafts carried out by members of the Village staff, and the Village's 18 completed buildings will be open to the public.

Landscaping work, approved by the Board, has been completed in front of both Summit View and Orchard Park Public Schools.

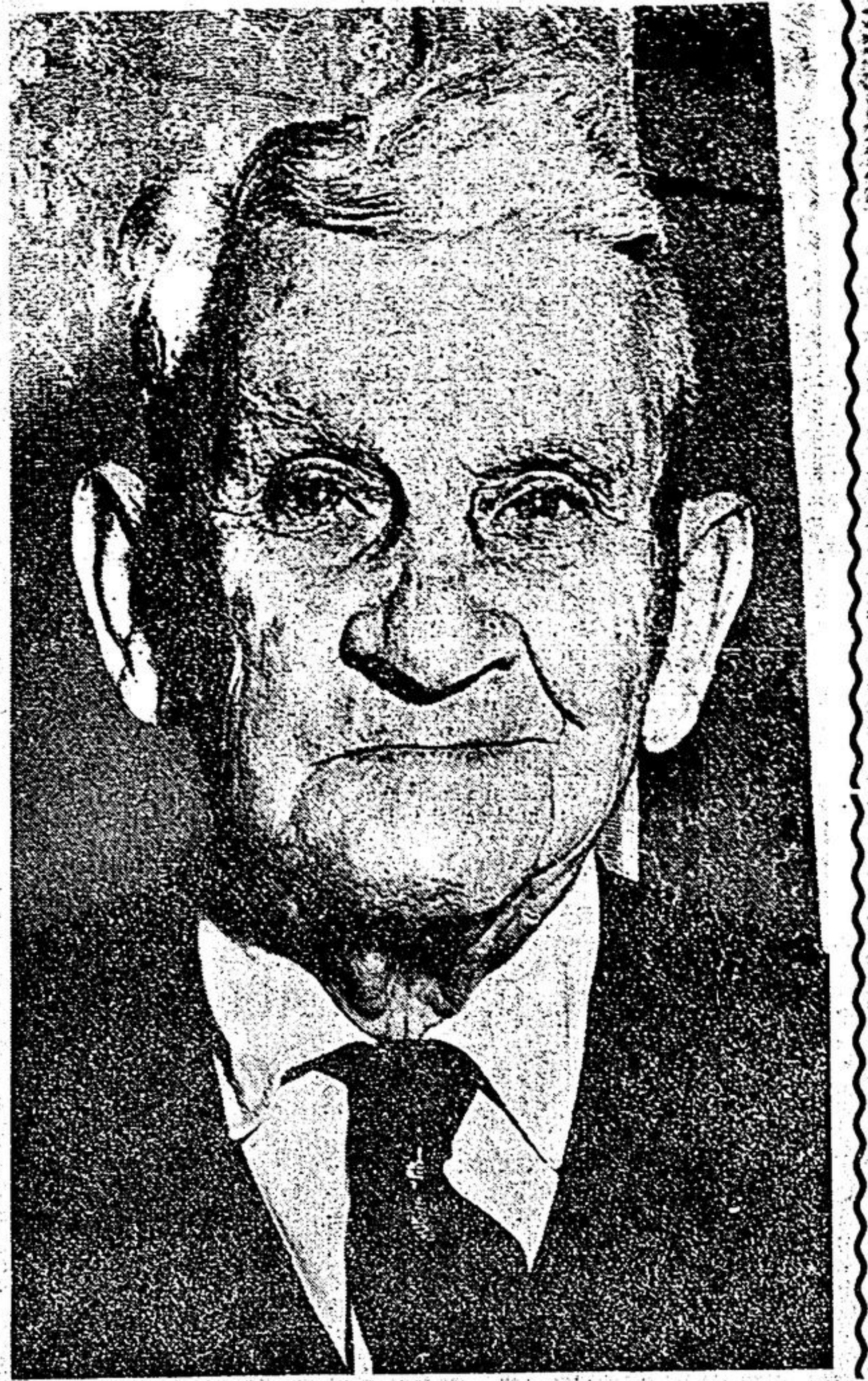

## A Salute To A Senior Citizen

STOUFFVILLE — As part of Stouffville's centennial events' program during 1967, the committee is honoring senior citizens of the community who have reached or exceeded 90 years. The Tribune, working in co-operation with this committee, is featuring a short biography of a lady or gentleman each week who has reached this milestone. We are pleased then, to pay tribute to Mr. Robert Burnett, Main Street, West, Stouffville who, on July 21st will mark his 93rd birthday.

MR. ROBERT BURNETT has resided in Stouffville for the past 28 years. Before this, he moved around considerably but never far from the Stouffville area. He lives with his sister, Clara (Mrs. Austin Wagg). One brother, Herbert, passed away in 1960 and a sister, Luella (Mrs. John Dougherty) died in 1962. His wife, the former Sarah Hall died September 20, 1966 at the age of 90. They had marked their 65th wedding anniversary.

BORN NEAR BLOOMINGTON Mr. Burnett, the son of Daniel Burnett and Mary Stapleton, was born on a farm south of Bloomington in the Township of Whitchurch. Howard Doner now works the property.

Mr. Burnett's hearing is not as keen as it once was but the very mention of Will Fockler's name brings forth a pleasant smile and hearty chuckle. "I remember how Herb (a brother) and I used to play football in the 'flats' at Bloomington. Will used to sit on the fence". He was a kind of one-man cheering section. They both attended the Bloomington School at the same time although Will was a few classes ahead. Mr. Burnett can recall when the old school was torn down and the present building erected. Another old friend is Sam McKuen of Markham.

Mr. Burnett helped to build the Bloomington Christian Church, using his horse team to draw materials to the site. A member there for many years, he now belongs to the Memorial Christian Congregational Church in Stouffville.

ENJOYED TRAINING COLTS Horses played an important part in farm life during the late 1800's and Mr. Burnett, was an accomplished trainer of colts. He raised his own. Dr. Walter Sangster of Stouffville was one of the first to own a car or 'gasoline buggy' as it was commonly called. Mr. Burnett has owned seven cars.

Prior to coming to Stouffville, he lived on the farm where Mrs. Arthur Wideman now resides and later at Thornhill. At one time, he owned ten homes in town. All are now sold.

Mr. Burnett, a farm boy, knows what it is to put in a day's hard work. In spite of his 92 years, he finds it difficult to sit back and take life easy. Although confined to indoors during recent weeks, he was a familiar figure shovelling off the sidewalk during the winter and cutting the grass in the early spring.

Stouffville salutes Mr. Robert Burnett, a prominent senior citizen of 92 and only twenty-three days away from 93.
