BUTTONVILLE — Markham Township Council has approved the proposal of York Downs Golf and Country Club to re-establish their 27-hole golf course on the 420-acre Glenburn Farms Ltd. at Unionville.
 York Downs Club is one of the oldest in the city, located at the corner of Bathurst and Sheppard Avenues. The club has been offered over five million dollars for its Toronto property and has an option on the Unionville farm for \$950,000. The club directors have approved the deal and only await the sanction of the members.

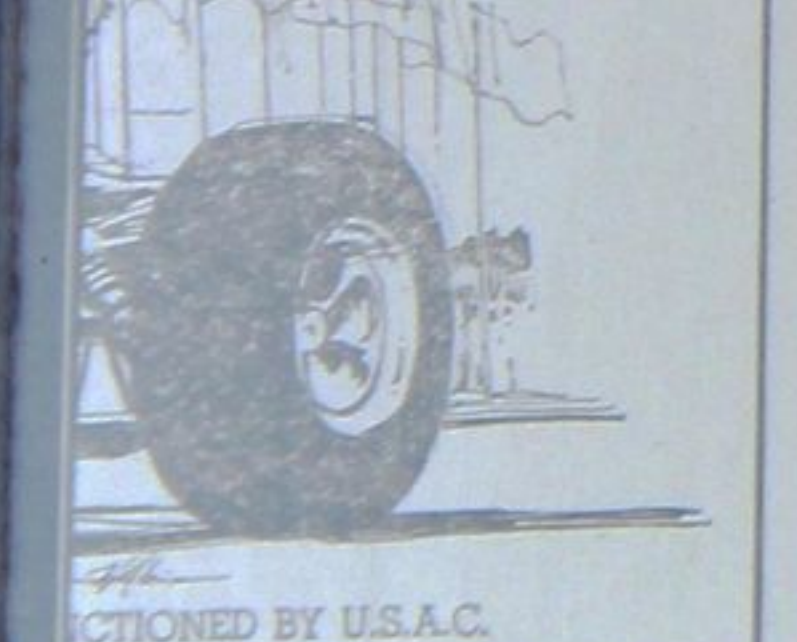

Pickering Approves Dog Licence Hike

PICKERING — Councilor Harvey Spang read a dog control by-law at a Pickering Township council meeting Monday night, one clause of which he protested.
 Although the by-law, that included the increase in dog licence fees, \$5 for the first male, and \$7.50 for the second; \$8 for the first female, \$13 for the second (over 2 females, \$25) was passed Mr. Spang and Deputy Reeve Mrs. McPherson opposed it on a recorded vote.
CONTROL NEEDED
 Mr. Spang didn't see why Pickering Twp. should charge more than other municipalities, and didn't think council should be concerned about how many dogs there were, but about control of them. Mrs. McPherson agreed.
 "Should we refund a portion of the 1967 licences paid this year?" asked Reeve Laycox.
 Mr. Spang insisted on making a notice of motion that a recommendation to the 1968 council be made that the dog licence be decreased.
 Included in the by-law is an increase in pound fees \$5.00 for impoundment and \$5 per day until the dog is claimed.
 The pound is open from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. and from 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. Mondays to Fridays and from 9 to 11 a.m. on Saturdays. It is closed on Sundays. Dogs are fed and watered for 72 hours after impoundment and if not claimed then, they are destroyed.
 "For infraction, a fine of \$50."

Centennial In Cedar Grove

CEDAR GROVE — There will be a Birthday Party to celebrate Centennial Year in Cedar Grove and the memory of the day will be tucked away in the minds of the participants. Private reviewing whenever they wish. But a party is an ephemeral tribute and, in Cedar Grove, only one of fourteen projects that will mark this historical year. At the moment evidence of our celebration is centred around the Community Park where a flagpole and new light standards have been installed, where a beautiful red, white and blue maple leaf garden decorates the north slope, where a large six-sided, three pit Bar-B-Que of split native stone rises to completion and where soon a hand-carved sign will mark the Park for visitors.
ERECT SIGNS
 The extremities of the hamlet are also to be designated and attractive signs are underway and this is only the beginning. By August a map of Cedar Grove School Section will be available showing property lines, buildings and ownership in 1867 and 1967. There will be a book exploring the unique qualities of our village in a light vein and, for the spoon collectors, a Centennial remembrance to add to the collection.
 Festivities began appropriately with a Centennial Dance in the schoolhouse in June and July will see a float depicting our traditional Apple Butter Festival in Markham's parade.
GALA AFFAIR
 The Birthday Party will be a gala affair at the Community Park August 12. Beginning in early afternoon with a ceremonial opening, there will be games of all kinds for all ages and entertainment will include a musical program by our own Centennial Children's Choirs. On Sunday, August 13, a service of a more serious nature is planned at the same spot.
 Responsible for co-ordinating all these projects is Harold Clendenen under whose guidance an unwieldy plan involving seven people a year ago, is nearing completion with the involvement of nearly everyone in the village.
 The original Centennial Committee consisted of: Floyd Clendenen, David Ritchie, Peter McGowan, Pat McClellan, Bert Tapscott, Helen Little and the late Blodwen Davies. To that nucleus many have been added for special assistance on various projects.
"CENTENNIAL FEVER"
 That is only Community Club activity. Centennial has hit Cedar Grove everywhere. Red, white and blue gardens bloom up and down the Tenth and provincial symbols adorn 1967 quilts. Expo is drawing Cedar Grovers like a magnet and those who visit the Fair will see Chris Chapman's uniquely revealing film about Ontario and Brian McKenna's startling iron sculpture in the Man in the Community theme pavilion.
 This year, following a suggestion in 1966 by Blodwen Davies, some of the Mennoite women will reap their first crop of Star of Bethlehem to be used in the making of digitalis and the C.G.I.T. are working on a Centennial Quilt to include every name in Cedar Grove. At Zion Church the U.C.W. objective is to supply new gowns for the choir.

 Of course, Cedar Grove had a head start on the

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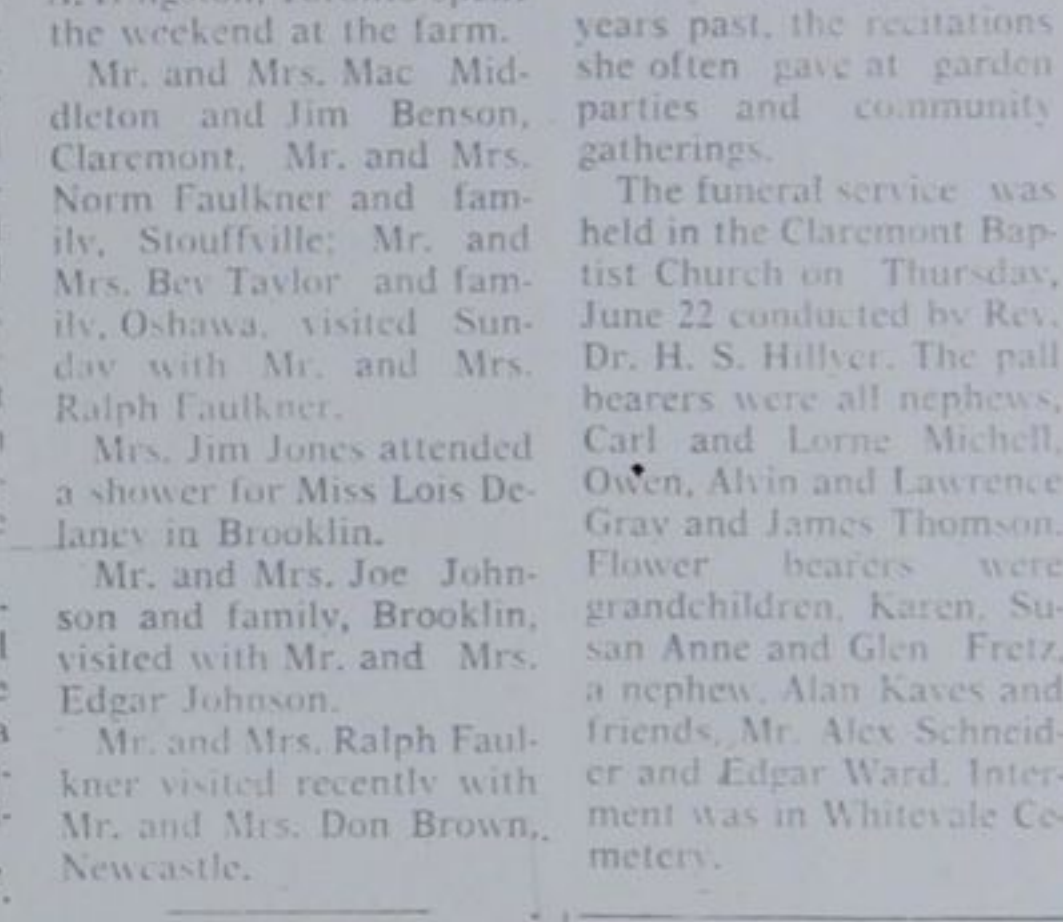
Organist 16 Years
