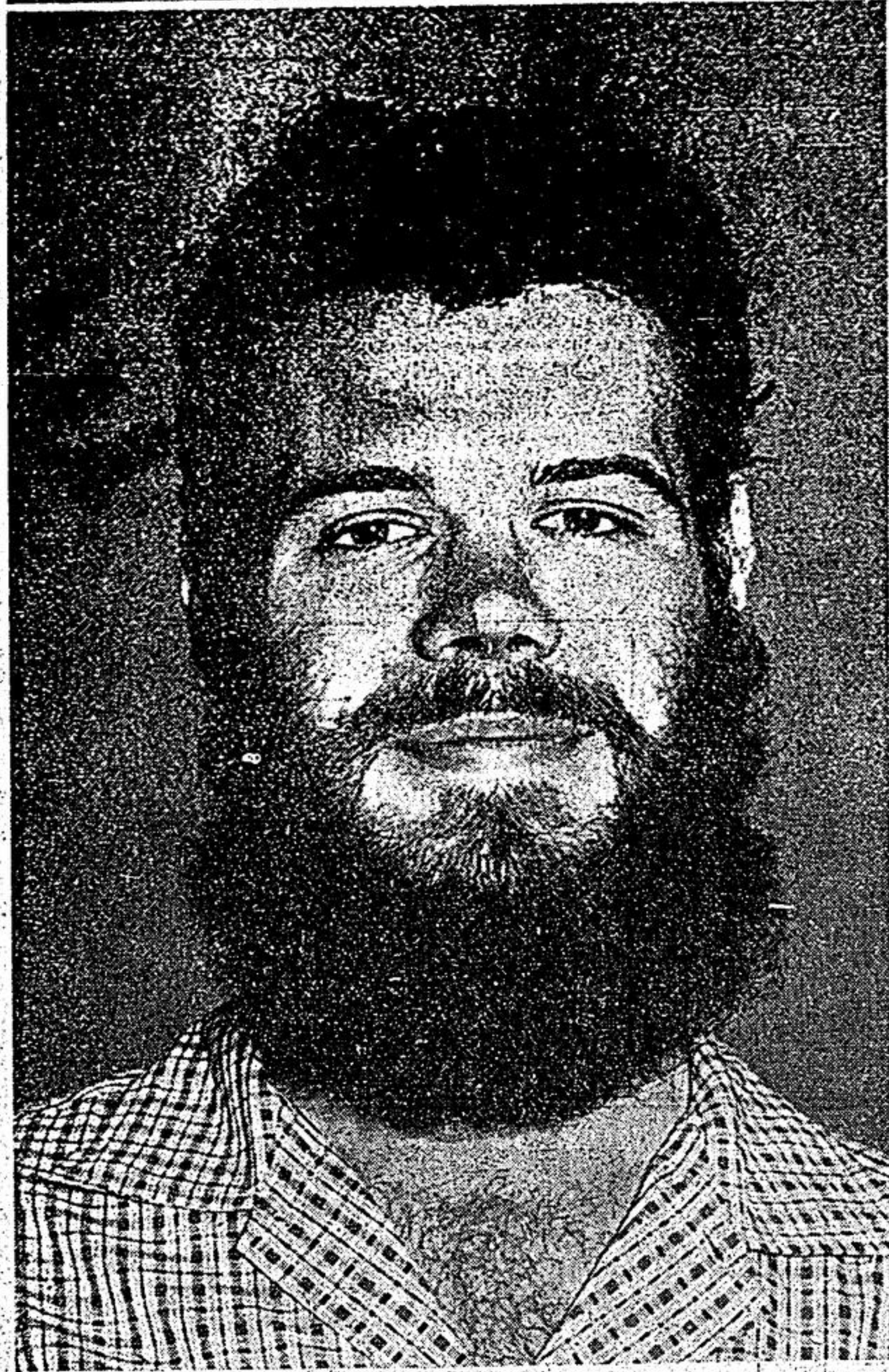

Bruce Rutherford Will Attend 4-H Seminar

STOUFFVILLE — Bruce Rutherford, 18, of R.R. 1, Stouffville will represent York County at a 4-H Youth Seminar August 5-12 in L'Esperel, Quebec.

Bruce has been a member of 11 clubs in 4-H ranging from corn to electrical clubs. He was chosen for this honor last year at a 4-H leadership camp in Guelph.

The purpose of the seminar is to broaden the educational focus of 4-H. The theme of the project will be "Rural Youth and His World."

This trip was made possible recently when the Centennial Commission announced that two grants totalling \$20,000 have been awarded to 4-H Youth Travel programs in 1967.

This project is the Council's major Centennial Year project.

Nine delegates will represent Ontario 4-H clubs at the fifth Annual interprovincial 4-H Exchange that will take place July 10-24.

This particular exchange has become recognized as one of the outstanding annual activities in Canada's 4-H Club movement.

Similar to previous years, it will be organized by the provincial 4-H Departments and the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs and financed by the Royal Bank of Canada.

A total of 90 award-winning 4-H club members, nine from each province will be participating in the exchange with each dele-

gate awarded a two-week farm home stay in a province other than his own.

York County has none of Ontario's delegates this year although it has been well represented in the exchange in recent years.

4-H FARM SAFETY

In a policy statement on farm safety, R. E. Brack of Saskatoon, President of the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs announced this week that "Farm safety education is too important in scope to be treated as a separate project. Rather, it is considered an activity in which each 4-H club member is encouraged to participate."

The Council said that some examples of farm safety activities through which 4-H members in Canada can take part in are Public demonstrations on safety, farm and home hazard hunts, and safety in operating farm equipment.

These activities are designed to stimulate a special awareness of safety during National Farm Safety Week throughout Canada and the U.S., July 23-29, which has been officially endorsed by the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs.

Among the most notable recent 4-H farm safety campaigns in Canada is the assistance in the sale of the Slow Moving Vehicle sign.

To date, 4-H sales of the sign in Canada are in excess of 20,000 signs.

Results Not Published

STOUFFVILLE — Student promotion results from Grade 9 to 12 at Stouffville District High School, will not be published in The Tribune as has been the practice in previous years. The decision was revealed this week by the Principal, Mr. W. E. Duxbury. The names of successful students in Grade 13 have not been made public since 1965.

Mr. Duxbury said that the policy had been adopted following a discussion by school department heads and members of the Board. The initial recommendation was submitted by the Department of Education three years ago, Mr. Duxbury said. He noted that student accomplishments on a pass or fail basis are considered as "private" and should be treated as such. He said that the same policy has been adopted by most high schools in York County.

Mr. Duxbury pointed out too that with so many different courses now offered at Stouffville, it was possible for students to arrange transfers from one to the other. He said that this process was difficult to explain on paper and often misleading.

REMINDER TO MOTORISTS

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE ONTARIO HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT

MECHANICAL FITNESS OF USED CARS
A used motor vehicle must be certified as mechanically fit by any dealer who sells it for use on the highways. An unfit vehicle may only be sold after the plates have been removed and returned to the Department. The purchaser will receive a Bill of Sale.

After repairs, registration plates can be obtained for such a vehicle by submitting, to the Department, the Bill of Sale and a Certificate of Fitness signed by a certified motor mechanic. EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1967.

RESTRICTIONS ON TOWING
It is illegal to drive a passenger car or station wagon with more than one vehicle in tow. EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1967.

SPEED LIMITS IN CONSTRUCTION ZONES
New legislation now authorizes special speed zoning for marked construction sites. Motorists are required to obey reported speed limits. EFFECTIVE NOW.

REPORTING OF MEDICALLY UNFIT DRIVERS
It is the duty of every legally qualified medical practitioner to report to the Registrar the name, address and diagnosis of every person coming under his diagnosis, treatment, care or charge who is suffering from a condition that in the opinion of the medical practitioner is such as to make it dangerous for such person to operate a motor vehicle. EFFECTIVE NOW.

MOTORCYCLES REQUIRE TWO BRAKING SYSTEMS.
Every motorcycle when being operated on a highway shall be equipped with at least two braking systems each with a separate means of application with one effective on the front wheel and one effective on the rear wheel. EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1967.

AIRCRAFT ON HIGHWAYS
When an aircraft makes an emergency landing on a highway, the pilot must have it removed within a reasonable time.

When an aircraft is being driven or drawn along a highway, its movement must comply with the provisions of the Highway Traffic Act. EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1967.

MUFFLERS
New requirements as to mufflers have been enacted, prohibiting the use of a muffler cut-out, straight exhaust, gutted muffler, hollywood muffler, by-pass or similar device upon a motor vehicle. EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1967.
