Conservation Area Extended  
GLEN MAJOR — A provincial grant of \$11,000 to the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority for extension of the Glen Major conservation area has been approved.

The area, some 1,117 acres in Uxbridge township, forms the source area for Duffin Creek. It was acquired by the Authority during the period 1958-67.

The land to be acquired for the extension of the area is described by the Authority as very picturesque, lending itself to a low density form of recreation which is consistent with forest and wildlife areas.

All member municipalities have been designated as benefitting and will be levied the Authority's share of the cost.
