STOUFFVILLE — When eighteen year old Sally Thomas walks down the Main Street of Stouffville, all eyes turn. It matters not if she's wearing a casual blouse and blue jeans on a Sunday afternoon or a party dress on Saturday night, she automatically attracts attention. Why?

Sally's main attribute is her neatness. Everything she wears, she wears well.

Stouffville or even Canada cannot take pride in claiming this pert 5' 2" brunette as a native. She's from Narberth, Pembrokeshire, Wales. A distinctive accent gives her away.

Sally and her family, that includes two brothers and two sisters, left their homeland aboard the Empress of England, four years ago. She enjoys her job at the Village Shop, operated by Mrs. Lloyd Weldon. "Many of the girls that come in are my own age, I like waiting on them." She admits that new stock and new styles can sometimes prove tempting. Her own wardrobe is an excellent advertisement for her place of employment since she models her clothes well.

Sally has no steady boyfriend but a host of good friends. She enjoys playing tennis, bowling and riding horseback. The Weldon family have several riding horses on their home property, north-east of town.

In Wales, cricket and soccer are two of the most popular spectator sports, comparable to hockey in Canada and baseball in the United States.

How do teenagers compare? Sally feels that there is very little difference. If anything, a teen girl in Canada enjoys a little more freedom than in Wales. "I don't think that parents here are quite as strict," she said.

Sally's desire is to some day return to Narberth, Pembrokeshire, Wales when she saves up sufficient funds to make the trip. We can only hope that she makes it a two-way ticket — one to go and one to come back.
