The Children's Season

Now that school is out in Stouffville and area the streets are full of carefree children running around like playful puppies, it is best to ease up on the throttle.

The law recognizes the fact that children are not responsible for their acts in the broad sense that adults are. They dash out on a road without looking, despite dozens of warnings from anxious parents. Caution and carefree youth have a difficult time together. That's why school zones have extra low speed limits usually rigidly enforced.

When school is out for the summer, school zones are spread out everywhere children roam. So if you see children playing on the road, slow up well in advance and give them a wide berth when you go pass.

In the United States there is a death on the highway every 13 minutes and an injury every 23 seconds. At this rate, one out of every two Americans faces the prospect of being killed or injured in a traffic accident during his lifetime.

The most tragic of these accidents are those involving children who are killed or crippled before their life has hardly begun. To lose a little time on the chance of saving a little life are odds that any motorist would be foolish indeed to ignore.

He can be on the right end of the odds by just reducing speed, the number one cause of fatalities.
