Prior to his marriage he took up residence on the Brock Road, south of Brougham, and lived there up until the time of his sudden death. Mr. and Mrs. Bayles marked their 54th wedding anniversary this month.

The deceased had been an active member of St. John's United Church at Brougham and served as a Steward in the congregation for many years.

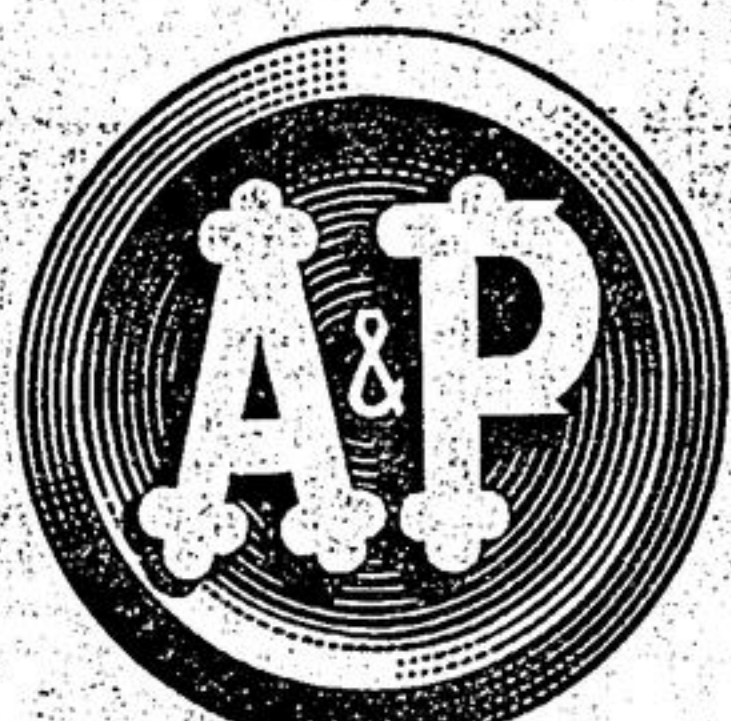
