## Surplus Funds

CLAREMONT — At the end of the current year, 1967, the police village status of Claremont will be dissolved. Many ratepayers are reluctant however, to turn over all surplus funds to Pickering Township as required by the Municipal Act. The amount of money available has been estimated at \$11,000. An application has been submitted, asking that this money be placed in trust and used for future improvements to Claremont sidewalks and street lights.

The resolution, approving the recommendation was passed by Pickering Council, August 8 and forwarded to the Ontario Municipal Board. Reeve Ignore Clifford Laycox wasn't optimistic over its chances. "I can almost guarantee that any surplus will go Claremont back to the general fund," he said.


