## Watson Wrestling Team Rescue Each Other

**STOUFFVILLE** — Stouffville wrestling fans were treated to one of the most spectacular of ring matches ever presented here, with a two-hour action-packed show in the Arena, Wednesday night.

The thrill-a-minute card even mixed in a little beauty with the brawn as a pair of lady judo artists performed a series of acrobatics between the ropes.

The largest crowd ever to see a professional bout here, received their full money's worth of comedy and excitement. The comedy was provided by the Midgets, Frenchie Lamonte and Roger Littlebrook. The excitement was dished up by Whipper Billy Watson and his son, Whipper Jr.

**DISQUALIFIED** — In the preliminary, father Watson roared into the ring like a runaway locomotive to flatten 'Blackjack' Daniels, after the 235 pound Texan was observed throttling Whipper Jr. against the ropes. Watson Sr. was immediately disqualified.

In the Main Event, it was Watson Jr. who decided that 'poppa' Whipper had taken enough abuse from the 335 pound Masked Yankee. He came out of nowhere to intercede and the entire ring was transformed into a whirling mass of heads, arms and legs. The Watson team was declared the winners and the crowd went wild.

Whipper Jr. and Roger Littlebrook took two of the three falls in the middle match. A portion of this bout was staged under the ring as Littlebrook ducked and dodged his

228 pound adversary in hot pursuit.

The lady combatants refused to be overshadowed by the men, in fact few men would want to engage in a tussle with either girl.

One did and she nearly broke his back. The blonde, Joyce Grable by name, would do justice to the centre spread of Playboy. Although women wrestlers are not permitted to become embroiled in mid-ring brawls in Ontario, this pair threatened

to toss the rule through the ropes. Referee Tiger Tasker hesitatingly stepped between the boosy beauties and whisked them off to the showers.

Fans, over 800 of them, more than satisfied with the show, are calling for more of the same. They may have to wait till next year, according to Arena Manager, Joe Lewis. If the return engagement is comparable to Wednesday's opener, it will be worth waiting for.

Tom Benson stole a hit off Gerry McGuckin's bat in the 6th for one of Claremont's best defensive plays of the night. Barber 'robbed' George Redshaw in the 8th with bare-hand-

ed catch and nipped Jim Redshaw at 1st for two. George and Jim Redshaw shared the Claremont mound chores.

Goodwood's Rae McGuckin was injured in the third inning when team mate Ron Evans caught him with an elbow in the eye. The contest was delayed for a time following the collision but no substitutes were required.

Everyone, young and old, is invited to enter. Age or sex is no barrier.

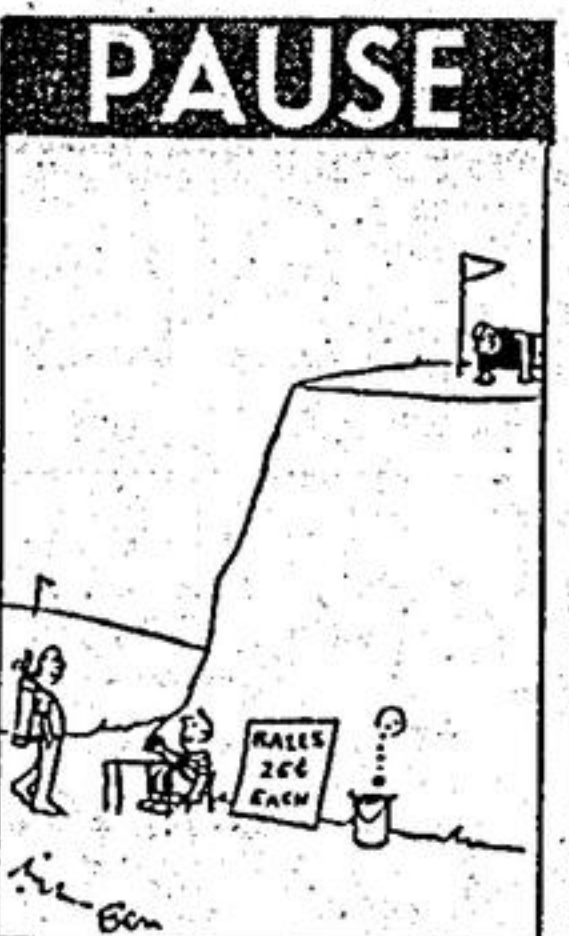

Be Sure Your Car Repairs Are Necessary

Though some motorists feel that dishonesty is a common practice in the auto repair business, lack of the ability to diagnose trouble is almost always the real difficulty.

One of the common causes of bad diagnosis is the practice of "listening" for a few seconds to engine noises and then coming up with a snap decision on the cause of the trouble.

A sharp knocking noise that was diagnosed as a burned-out connecting rod — and estimated as a very costly repair — turned out to be a rubber fan belt with two teeth missing, in a case we heard of recently. Similar examples are commonplace.

Engine noises can be important and can give you a warning of impending trouble, so they should not be ignored. But they should be checked out fully by an experienced mechanic equipped with the instruments necessary to do the job properly.

A full time growl is usually the result of an automatic transmission that is out of fluid and usually indicates a leak.

A clattering noise at the front of the engine may mean a faulty water pump or generator bearings.

A squeak or clicking is usually a dry front wheel bearing that can cause the wheel to ultimately lock.

If a quick diagnosis indicates an expensive repair, it will pay you to have an expert check your car thoroughly.
