

Though some motorists feel that dishonesty is a common practice in the auto repair business, lack of the ability to diagnose trouble !s almost always the real...

One of the common causes of bad diagnosis is the practice of "listening" for a few seconds to engine noises and then coming up with a snap decision on the cause of the trouble.

A sharp knocking noise ideat was diagnosed as a burned-out connecting rod — and estimated as a very costly repair — turned out to be a rubber fan belt with two teeth missing, in a case we heard of recently. Similar examples are commonplace.

Engine noises can be important and can give you a warning of impending trouble, so they should not be ignored. But they should be checked out fully by an experienced mechanic equipped with the instruments
