


New Whitchurch Park Opened This Summer

VANDORF — Just north of Vandorf, on the Don Mills Road in Whitchurch Township is located a new private park and playground. It was opened for the first time this summer and indications are that it will become a very popular place. It is called 'Olympia Park.'

Back of the project are two partners, Peter Tossios and Matee Vasso. The park is situated at the top of a 300 foot hill and the view of surrounding countryside is breathtaking. The manager is Angelo Liatopoulos.

The parkland contains 50 acres, complete with picnic tables, barbecues, sports fields; hot and cold showers; shelters, swings and slides; a wading pool for the children and an olympic-size swimming pool. The large pool is to be heated and this work will be completed in two weeks. Two lifeguards are on duty at all times.

The olympic pool lacks boards. This is a safety for one thing — diving factor, according to the manager. He said that next year, a new pool will be built for divers only. Although this has not been a good summer season for such outdoor activities, Mr. Liatopoulos said that in a single day two

weeks ago, they had 3,000 people on their grounds. Weekends are, of course, the busiest periods.

The admission to the park is very reasonable — adults, 50c and children 25c. Just to sit down and enjoy the view is worth that.

Councillor Ronald Chatten commended Mr. Mitchell highly, and said that it would be difficult to find as competent a treasurer to replace him. His resignation was accepted with regret.

Pitcher Kayoed By Ball Blanks Playoff Rivals

CLAREMONT — Goodwood pitcher Ken May, recovered from a blow on the head in the 4th inning Wednesday, to turn in one of the finest mound efforts of a colorful career.

The accident occurred during an Ontario Rural Softball Association playoff game in Claremont with Strabane at bat and Goodwood out front 5-0. A throw-in ball hit May hard on the head and he dropped unconscious to the ground. Following a five minute delay, he agreed to continue. He retired the side and went on to fire a masterful no-hitter.

Goodwood blanked their rivals 11-0 in the 'rubber match' of a 3-game series. More than 300 fans attended the contest. Goodwood now advances into the next round of ORSA competition.

Strabane killed themselves in the field. They committed a total of eight errors. Goodwood had two miscues but only six balls were hit into the outfield during the entire contest and four of these were taken for routine outs.


