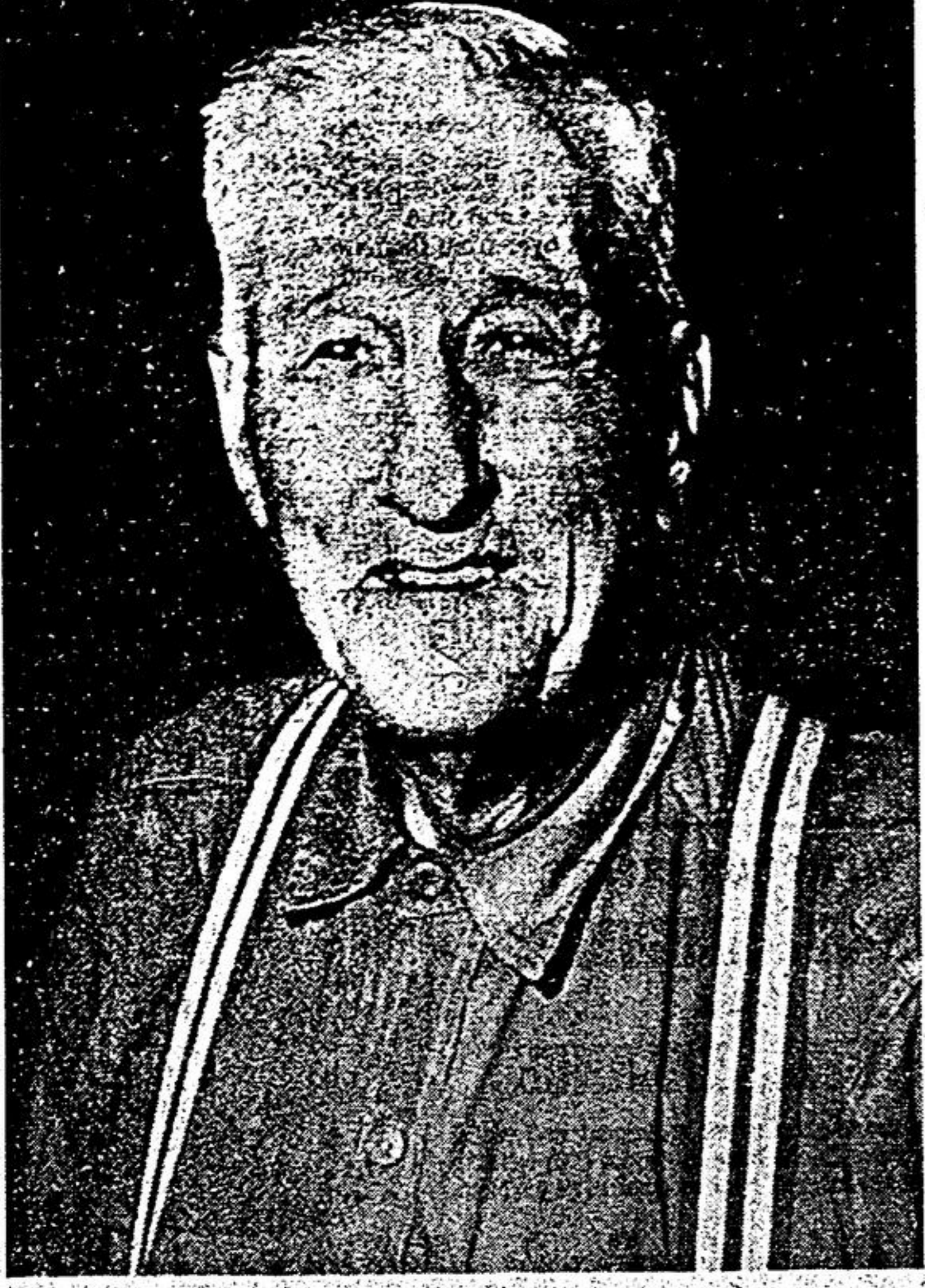


# Couple Honored Farewell Gathering

## A Salute To A Senior Citizen

STOUFFVILLE — Few folks around Stouffville are better known than Jonathan Morgason. He should be known well since he's been on the go in the area since May 1, 1874 — ninety-three years. He indeed qualifies for recognition as a senior citizen in this, Canada's centennial year.

Jonathan Morgason was born near Garibaldi in Uxbridge Township, the son of John Morgason and Sarah Morton. There were eleven in the family.

His parents came from England in 1830. Mr. Morgason attended public school at Glasgow but he admits that his education was attained on a kind of hit and miss basis. Most of the instruction was provided during the winter months since Jonathan was needed to help on the farm during the seeding and harvest seasons.

At the age of only 9, he could handle a team and plow as well as any adult. He can recall taking the horses down to Latham's blacksmith shop, Altona to have them shod.

His brother later purchased the home farm and the two worked it together. At the age of 27, he was married. "What a day that was," he recalled, "I got up early, did the chores, drove by horse and buggy to Altona where my wife was staying at Henry Elson's. We then drove to Stouffville, purchased two rings and a license and then on to Aurora where we were married at a friend's house."

The following day, Mr. Morgason took a job at King Horn Tannery in King City but he remained there only a short time. In 1903 he went into the fencing business with his brother, Tom and later did it alone. He became known throughout the countryside. In addition to this work, he operated a 60 acre farm south of Goodwood.

Seven years later, he moved to Montreal Street in Stouffville.

Mrs. Morgason passed away in 1954. He lives in a cottage residence at Musselman's Lake but usually comes to town at least once a week to talk over old times with his friends and obtain a haircut at Snowball's Barbershop. "Why that man Snowball has been cutting hair for nearly 40 years," he said.

In spite of his 93 years, Mr. Morgason's fence-building ability is still in demand. The fence at the foot of the Memorial Park in Stouffville shows his handiwork.

What has contributed most to Mr. Morgason's longevity? "Good living and lots of hard work and I've had my share of both," he replied without hesitation.
