. Major reconstruction will occur in the area of concession 5 to remove the old 'boot-jack hill,' long a problem for motorists during winter months. The new route will proceed easterly from conc. 4, then curve to meet the old section of Highway 47 at con. 5. One mile farther north, the sharp turn to the right will also be reduced.

East of the Town of Uxbridge, similar plans were outlined by Dr. Dymond, thus reducing the hazard in that area.


