

Open New Whitchurch Twp. Centennial Project, Saturday

Recreation Centre Near Ballantrae

BALLANTRAE—All the hard work, anticipation and enthusiasm that has gone into the building of a recreation centre east of Ballantrae, will be fully realized and appreciated on Saturday.

The site, many months in the making, will be officially opened at 1 p.m. by Senator Wallace McCutcheon of Gormley. The Centre is Whitchurch Township's centennial project.

A colorful program has been lined up, both afternoon and evening. In addition, there will be pony rides and races for the kiddies, beginning at 10 a.m.; softball games; a tug-of-war; a chicken barbecue; a corn roast; sing-song and dance.

WEALTH OF TALENT

A wealth of talent has been lined up for the afternoon program from 2 to 4 p.m. and in the evening from 7 to 9. Bob Lewis, a Stouffville councillor and now a Whitchurch land-owner at Bloomington, will M.C. the afternoon performance. Featured guests will include soloists Mary Harris, Linda Sargent and Jim Rehill, all of Stouffville; highland dancer Kathy Cummings of Altona; presentations by Molly Mumford's Edgevale Dance Class and a vocal duet by Lemonville's own Ali Nauta and Maura Koster.

Showman Wally Koster will take over as master of ceremonies for the evening program at 7. He will be accompanied by the talented Wideman sisters, Nancy and Sharon of Stouffville; the folksong harmony of Nancy Murphy, Trudy and Mike Cadjeux, also of Stouffville; a barbershop quartet, comprising Jim Rehill, Chuck Harrott, Jerry Waite and Lorne Boardway; two dance numbers from Music Mania '67 and the talented Danish Dancers of Toronto.

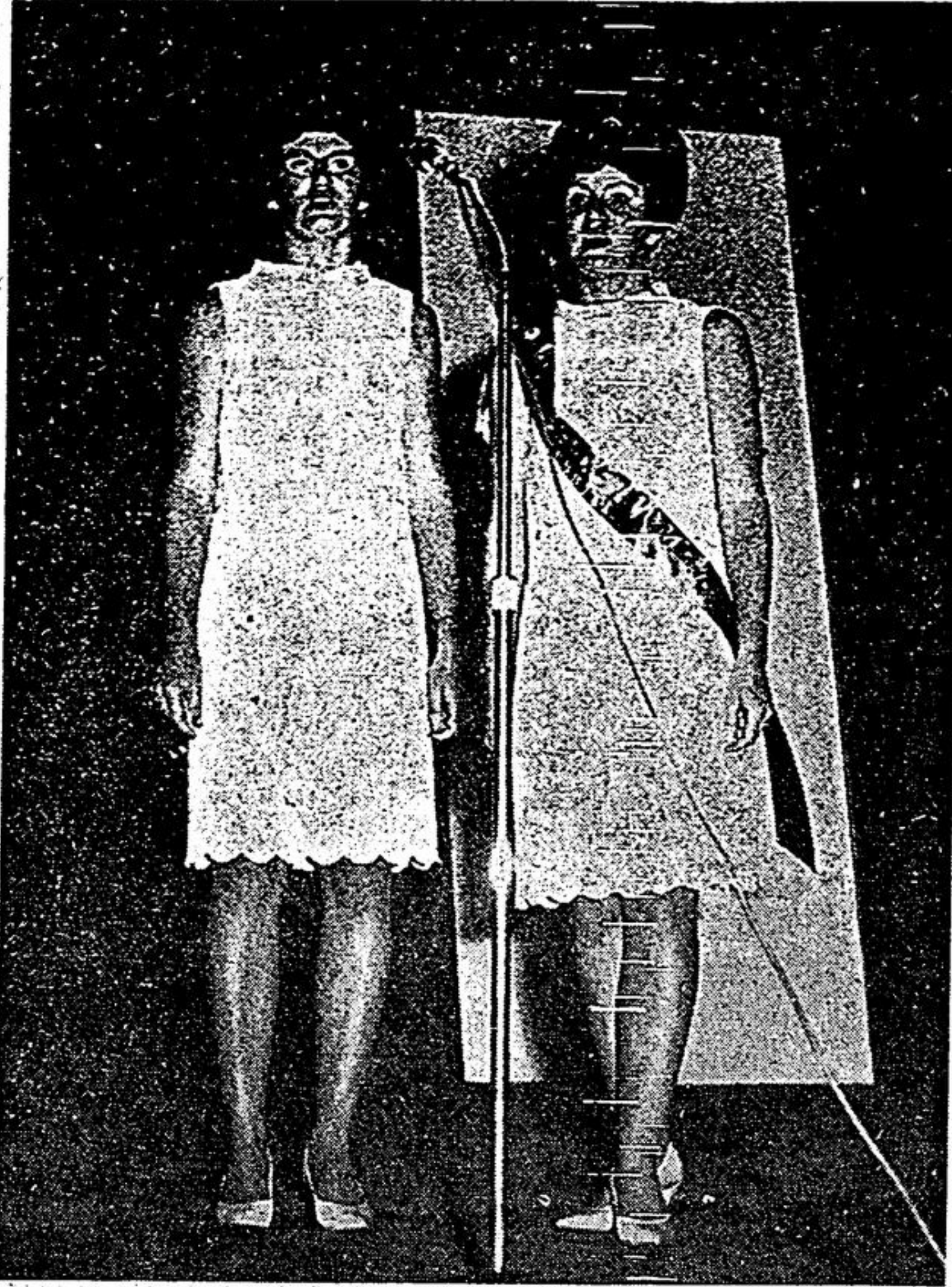
THREE BANDS

The evening sing-song will be led by Lorne Boardway of Stouffville with Clarion Baker at the organ. Live dance music will be provided by Earl Tyrone's band featuring many of the modern numbers for teens as well as square dance tunes for the oldsters.

The chicken barbecue supper will extend from 4 to 6 p.m.

The Whitchurch Recreation Centre, under construction for over two years, is located directly west of Ballantrae School and a half mile east of Highway 48. The variations of activities will make it a day of fun and enjoyment for the entire family.

Town Flood

'Terrible Situation' - Reeve

STOUFFVILLE — Reeve Ken Laushway described as "a terrible situation," the flood conditions and damage caused by the record rainfall that struck Stouffville, August 27.

In less than twelve hours the water level gauge measured six inches.

Mr. Laushway, in discussing the storm and the problems that followed described how one home in the Westlawn Crescent area, had water in the basement to a depth of fifteen inches. He said that a similar situation was encountered at Market and Somerville Streets. Nine driveways were washed out.

The Reeve said that both Fire Chief Walter Smith and Deputy Chief Fred Castle were on the job with the pumper on two separate occasions. "At ten o'clock we were beat," said Mr. Laushway, describing the condition at the disposal plant. He said he personally called in Beamish Construction Company in an effort to lower the water level with their equipment. He noted that the mid-town stream flooded over its banks but suggested that the new flood-control dam should solve this problem in the future. He termed it "an act of God".

Councillor Jim McKeller said that workmen had difficulty finding several manholes on the streets because they were covered up

with oil and sand.

"We have learned something from all this," said deputy-reeve Bill Parsons, "we're sadly lacking in supervision for our outside forces. This council must make a decision on this matter." Mr. Parsons said it was unfair to expect the Clerk to serve as a foreman. He said that Mr. Cor-

ner was already filling two other positions, that of administrator and solicitor. "We must obtain someone to assume outside authority," he said.

Reeve Ken Laushway contended that with the major portion of construction work now completed, this decision could be left with next year's council.

Sterilization Urged For Infant Beaters

VANDORF—Any person convicted of assault causing bodily harm to an infant should be sterilized, delegates representing 1,000 Women's Institute members in York County agreed.

"Why give these people the chance to bring more babies into the world just to batter them?" asked Mrs. Austin Rumble, chairwoman of the York-Centre district of the institute.

The 125 delegates at yesterday's meeting approved a brief intended for submission to the royal commission on the status of women. The York County body will ask the Ontario Women's Institute to endorse the brief before it is presented to the commission, but recommendations concerning the beating of babies will be forwarded immediately to Prime Minister Lester Pearson and other federal officials.

The brief urges that a person who fails to report an assault on an infant to the authorities be considered an accessory to the crime.

The York County brief also recommends diversion of money being spent on defense to the alleviation of hunger and suffering in Canada and elsewhere and that marriage breakdown be one of the grounds for divorce. It also urges the establishment of job retraining centres for older women in places other than large cities and calls for the standardization of the training programs in all provinces.

FATHER URGES

Bring 'Supplier' To Court

MARKHAM — A Markham Village father of six, speaking on behalf of his 16 year old son, suggested to Magistrate Russell Pearse that the supplier of liquor to teenagers, was as much at fault as the persons who consumed it.

Mr. George Jack, Alandale Road, admitted that his 16 year old son had been drinking. He said that he had been given wine by an older man but the adult had not been brought to court. "I feel that he should be here also, he said.

Police testified that William Jack was in a drunken condition when found and became violently ill in the village office. The boy pleaded guilty to drinking under age.

In registering a conviction, Magistrate Pearse agreed to suspend sentence but placed the youth on a three month bond to keep the peace at \$200.

In another case, Ted Redshaw of Clarendon was fined \$15 and costs for not having his motorcycle equipped with a dual braking system. Redshaw pleaded not guilty. He told Magistrate Pearse that his bike was so equipped when he purchased it but he removed the front brake after it rolled over on two occasions.

'Boot-Jack Hill' To Be Bypassed

GOODWOOD — The long-time highway hazard, two miles east of Goodwood is to be corrected.

Plans to remove the 'S' turns on a portion of the road between concessions 4 and 5, were outlined before Uxbridge Township Council at a recent meeting. In attendance to explain in detail the program was Dr. M. B. Dymond, M.P.P.

Major reconstruction will occur in the area of concession 5 to remove the old 'boot-jack hill,' long a problem for motorists during winter months. The new route will proceed easterly from conc. 4, then curve to meet the old section of Highway 47 at con. 5. One mile farther north, the sharp turn to the right will also be reduced.

East of the Town of Uxbridge, similar plans were outlined by Dr. Dymond, thus reducing the hazard in that area.
