BUTTONVILLE — One of the largest and most unique air shows of its kind ever seen in this country will be held Saturday, September 16 at the Buttonville Airport.

The six hour show which starts at noon features not only the usual jet performances but barn-storming biplanes, gliders, water-bombing, crop dusting, sky divers, aerobatics by top United States team members and top Canadian aces.

NEW AND OLD
On the ground over thirty separate displays of aircraft both new and old as well as other fascinating items will be there for inspection purposes.

One of the most interesting parts will be the performances by four World War I replicas, a Focker triplane, a Camal, a Spad and a Newport 28. They will not only be available for inspection on the ground but will fly in the show. Two of them will take part in a precision aerial dog fight.

The show which is jointly sponsored by the Toronto Junior Board of Trade and Toronto Airways Limited is for the benefit of the North York General Hospital, and will open its doors, at 10 a.m.

The gate fee of \$3.00 per car includes everyone although there will be cash-takers at the gate. Pre-sold tickets will speed up entrance to the grounds. These tickets are available at all Imperial Esso service stations from Lake Ontario to Lake Simcoe and from Port Hope to Hamilton.
