

BLOOMINGTON'- Centennial Ready-Mix, a huge \$200,000 concrete plant at Bloomington in Whitchurch Township, is rolling out the cement at the rate of 400,000 yards a

The structure, erected in April, is equipped with the most modern of automatic equipment. The owners, are brothers, Russ and Dave Forfar.

The plant with self-cona tained offices and shop, is fully winterized. Gravel storage capacity is 650 tons.
