The wedding reception

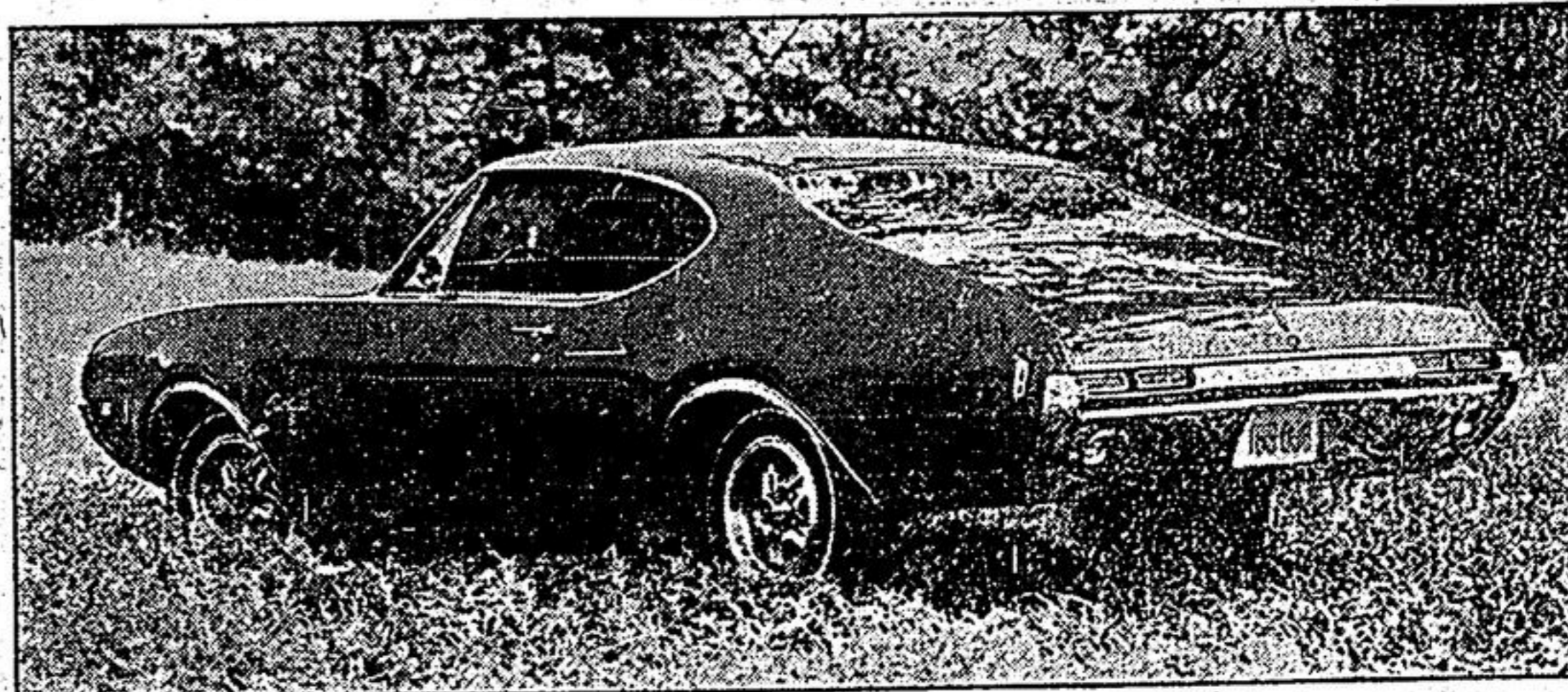

The bride chose a yellow organza coat and dress, black accessories and a corsage of yellow roses for a honeymoon to Ottawa, Montreal and Expo.

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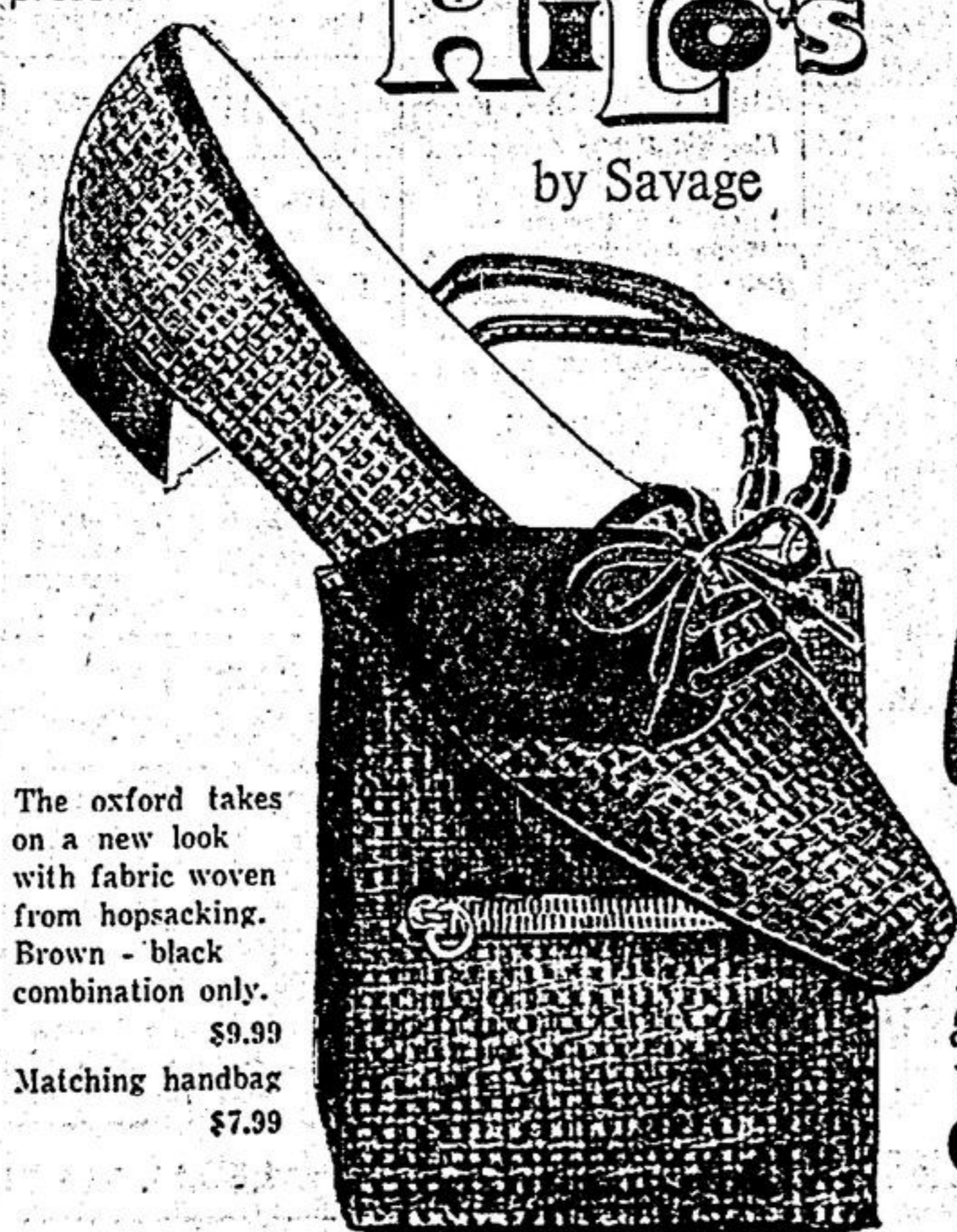
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## Nursing School Opened

NEWMARKET — The York Regional School of Nursing began operations on Monday, September 18, with a class of 61 students, 18 of whom are from the Newmarket and District area. As part of the plan enunciated in 1965 by the Honourable Matthew B. Dymond, Minister of Health, the School is financed by the Ontario Hospital Services Commission and will use the clinical facilities of York County Hospital, Newmarket, York Central Hospital, Richmond Hill, North York General Hospital as well as Baycrest and St. John's Convalescent Hospital.

Since the School's permanent quarters at Leslie Street and Sheppard have not yet been constructed, temporary accommodation for classrooms and offices has been provided in the North York General Hospital, and for students living in the Nurses' Residence of Sunnybrook Hospital.
