

CAMPAIGN FOR TOWN CURLING RINK

Begin Canvass In October

STOUFFVILLE — A new \$140,000 centennial curling rink has been proposed for the Village of Stouffville and a canvass of all interested persons in the area will begin next month. The initial objective is \$25,000 and subscriptions of \$100 or multiples thereof will be placed in a trust fund until the desired amount is raised. The committee chairman is Robert Hammond. The vice chairman is Dick Coffey.

In charge of the canvass will be Don Ferguson. He will be assisted by Ross Hetherington, Ron Lee, Dr. Terry O'Connor, Elmer Farthing, Joe Murray, Walter Smith, Bob Meakes and Ken Roberts.

All contributing parties will meet later to discuss the possibility of purchasing a desirable property and the feasibility of building and financing a modern curling rink from approved plans.

If the proposal is approved, a limited company would be formed and shares issued to the initial contributors. Such shareholders would be the owners of the company, elect the directors and establish the club's constitution.

If, in the opinion of the committee, there is insufficient financial support to warrant the successful establishment of the Club, all monies raised will be refunded to the respective contributors.

Mr. Ferguson told The Tribune that interest in the project was most encouraging and he was confident that the campaign would prove successful.

Team manager Ken Roberts attended a league organization meeting Sunday, and indications are that

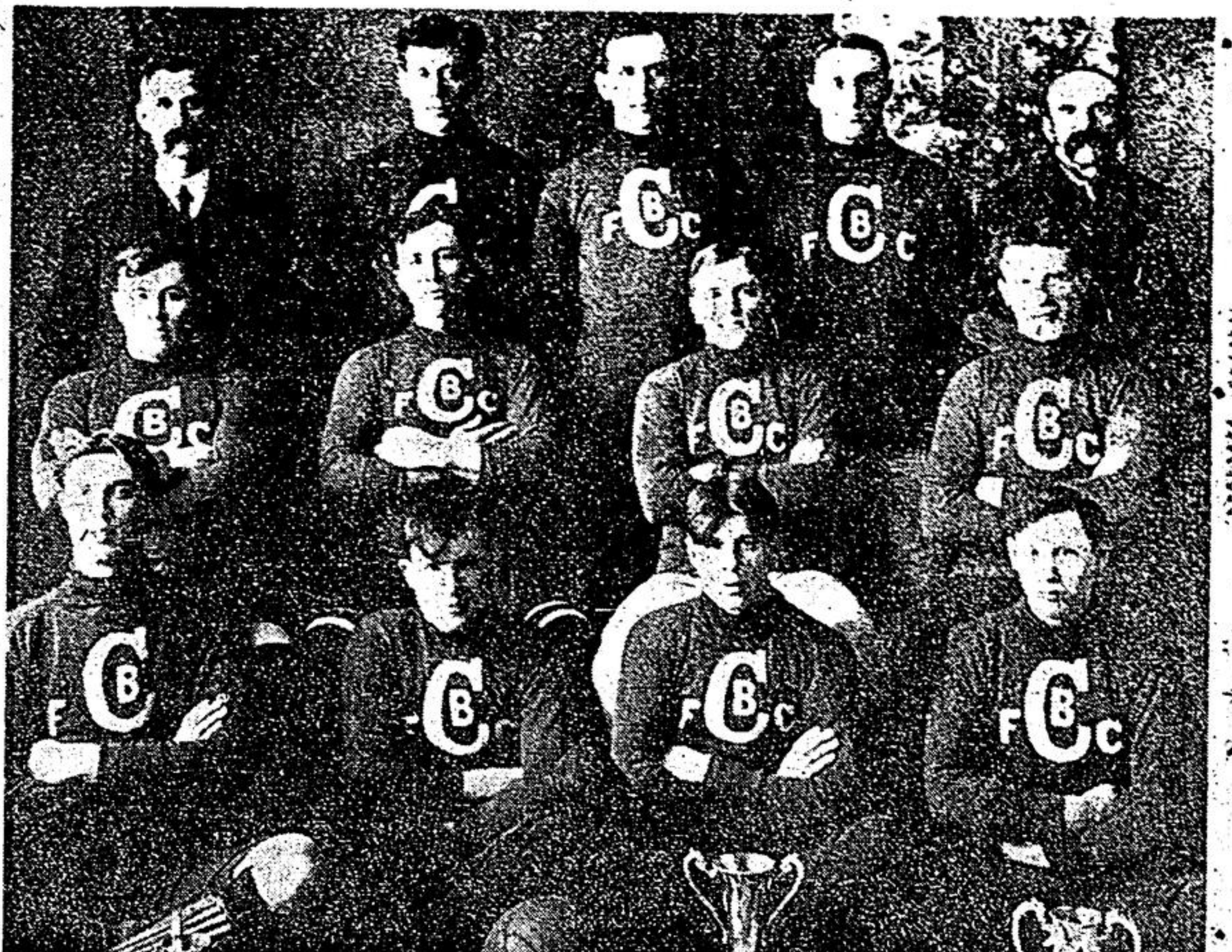
