

Five Hundred Attend Human Sexuality Clinic

MARKHAM—Sex is part of our total being — right down to our finger-tips — and it is a miracle that we should appreciate and try to understand, a Markham Village audience of more than 500 was told Sunday.

Dr. Bruce Hatfield of Calgary used the term "sexuality" to describe the profound differences between men and women. In addition to the distinctions of build, organs, the man's beard and so on, he pointed out that there were male-female differences in every single cell in the body.

Dr. Hatfield blended common sense with clinical detail, and humor with serious concern, in a three-and-a-half hour slide presentation in the auditorium of Markham District High School. He presented sexuality as a series of miracles that we should never regard casually but should respect all our lives, and keep trying to learn about.

Both adults and teenagers had been invited to this special program, and both came. More than half were adults. The young people were from Markham, Stouffville and Unionville areas.

Dr. Hatfield said he strongly favored sex education for young people, given frankly, honestly and in sound perspective. Knowledge and genuine understanding are needed to counter the "Playboy philosophy" that tries to reduce sex to a sort of toy.

Dr. Hatfield's presentation was arranged as a community service by St. Andrew's United Church in Markham. The program was introduced by Rev. Donald Parr of St. Andrew's, who had been a long-time friend and associate of the visiting speakers in Alberta.

Dr. Hatfield was assisted in his presentation by Rev. Ed Mullen, also of Calgary, who was the founder of that city's pioneering service in counselling and family life education.

Ivan Allen, who was in charge of local arrangements for the event, was chairman of the meeting. A Markham panel answered questions submitted from the audience, with the help of Dr. Hatfield and Mr. Mullen, to conclude the afternoon. Panel members were Dr. J. R. Scott, Mrs. Harold Humphrey, Grade 13 students Heather Doy and Earl Boyd, with Bruce Byrnes as moderator.



Everek R. Storms of Kitchener, editor of the Gospel Banner, will be the anniversary speaker at the Allona United Missionary Church, Sunday, October 1.
