STOUFFVILLE—Several local congregations are cooperating with the Faith Mission in Canada in a one-night rally, to be held in the Stouffville United Church on Sunday night, October 15, at seven-thirty. J. Allan Wallace, Director of the Faith Mission will conduct the service; and the speaker is to be a well-known Convention preacher both in Great Britain and North America, Rev. Dr. J. G. S. S. Thomson of Glasgow, Scotland. Dr. Thomson is a man of wide experience and of no mean scholarship. He served as a missionary in French North Africa, lectured for six years in Edinburgh University in the department of Hebrew and Semitic languages, and was professor of Hebrew and Old Testament in Columbia Theological Seminary. He is currently minister of St. David's, a large city parish church in Glasgow. Dr. Thomson is author of "The Old Testament View in Revelation", a number of articles in The Bible Dictionary (L.V.F.) and of commentaries on Jeremiah and Lamentations in The Living Themes of the Great Book Series.
