'Dream Home' Follows 'Nightmare'

GOODWOOD — April 20 1967 is a day that Wilfred and Kay Reher, Goodwood, R.R. 1, will never forget. Their home on the 3rd concession of Uxbridge Township, almost completed, was destroyed by fire.

Mrs. Reher had time only to rescue her youngest child and, accompanied by three others, playing outside at the time, ran to the home of a neighbor to call the brigade in Stouffville. "By the time I arrived back, it was all down." With the exception of the clothes they had on, everything was lost.

Such a tragedy would have broken the spirit of many couples but not Mr. and Mrs. Reher. The very next day, they began making plans to rebuild. Now, five months later, their "dream home" is well under way. Mr. Reher, an auto mechanic in Scarborough, is doing much of the work himself.

Mrs. Reher was expecting their fifth child at the time of the blaze. Todd, 3 months, is a bouncing baby boy. He joins Dean, 6, Nancy, 4½, Jill, 3½ and Christian, 2 in the happy family circle.

For a time, after the fire,

they lived at the home of her brother in Rexdale and later in Ajax. They then moved into a trailer on their present property until their two-car garage could be completed.

Both expressed appreciation with the assistance provided by neighbors. "Coming from Toronto we didn't expect it. It was wonderful," said Wilfred. "Before the fire we hardly knew anyone. Now we feel we know everyone," said Kay. Mrs. Reher said that following the arrival of baby Todd, a shower was held at the home of Mrs. Harvey and she received a complete layette. "No one will ever know how much it was needed and how much it was appreciated."

Mr. Reher said that the loss of the house was a major setback but the contents also represented a sizeable figure. "The very first day it cost us \$5 for combs and toothbrushes," he said.

With an unpleasant memory of an afternoon in April now behind them, Wilfred and Kay can now look forward to the day when they and their children take up permanent residence in their new bungalow. What they've accomplished they've earned.

LEGION NEWS

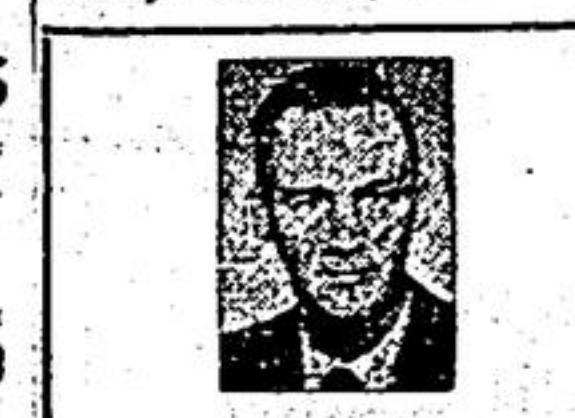
