ONTARIO COUNTY — The administration of welfare on a County-wide basis, has been turned down by Ontario County Council. The vote was 21 to 14.

Deputy Reeve Robert Attersley questioned the figure of \$50,000 that had been estimated to carry out the new program. He felt it would be considerably more.

Reeve Clifford Laycox of Pickering Township spoke in favor of the scheme. He said that it would not only be more economical but would also provide an improved service.
