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Family Heirloom

In a recent visit to relatives in Wisconsin, Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Jones of Interlaken, and formerly of Stouffville, were presented with a family heirloom in the form of an official robe, worn by a late uncle, while he was serving as viceroy of British India; possibly in the late 1800's.

The robe, fashioned from deep blue silk, features several broad embroidered panels, running from the collar band to the hem, which are in ivory. The garment retains much of its original beauty and grandeur in spite of the century and a half that it has been in ciruclation. A picture of the pal-

ace of the incumbent viceroy has been in the posession of the Jones family for many years.

Two brothers of the late Viceroy (Governor-General) emigrated to America about 1870; one settling in Petosky, Michigan, and the other, Edward, settled in Markham Township, following his marriage to Eve Stover. To this union were born two sons, Thomas and Jesse, who later settled in Wisconsin.

Following the passing of Eve Stover, Edward married Elizabeth Wideman, and to them were born two sons: Harman of Interlaken and Alex of Dickson's Hill, Ontario.



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
