## Too Rigid Control Over Farm Lot Sales

PICKERING — The Minister of Municipal Affairs will be petitioned to eliminate the 10-acre lot exception from the subdivision control provisions of the planning act.

Councillor Harvey Spang opposed this resolution so violently that Reeve C. W. Laycox referred to the procedural by-law, sharply rapped his gavel, and permitted the councillor to speak no more on the subject.

Mr. Spang was not averse to the 10-acre lot elimination—in fact he was in favor of a 25-acre lot—but he resented the rigid controls by the committee of adjustment on people who wished to divide their farms, claiming hardship on those who could not do what they liked with their own property.

Councillor Norm Walker, who also opposed the motion, said he could not go along with holding down to a 25-acre limit—it should be more—and stated that he disapproved 5 per cent going to park lands.

The resolution petitioned the Minister to eliminate the 10-acre lot exception, thereby allowing the committee of adjustment the same powers in dealing with land separations of over ten acres as they now have on land separations of under 10 acres.

More Problems Planning Director John Falkner said the township was carved into 10-acre holdings, which caused some problems now, and would continually cause more problems. Applications are permitted to build an accessory house, which does not help assessment. One 10-acre parcel, he said, was landlocked.

Mr. Spang declared he had not been invited to a joint meeting of planning and committee of adjustment where this matter had been discussed, re-

sulting in the recommendation. Reeve Laycox retorted that he had been invited, along with the other councillors, at a recent council meeting.

Opposes Policy Mr. Spang also opposed a resolution providing that the policy of residential accessory dwellings to agricultural uses be continued on the basis that the applicant be considered on past and existing experience as a farmer, tinued on the basis that approval be subject to a committee of the planning board viewing the site, with one elected representative as a member; and that none but physical evidence of farming, both by finance and labor, be taken into account.
