Editor's Mail

Dear Sir: The Whitchurch Conservation Club, or someone, has replied to my letter of Aug. 30, 1967, in the Stouffville Tribune, by sending me, Betty Ross, a mimeographed report dealing with my frustration and confusion, (their words), and a recital of the club's functions and achievements.

There was no covering letter, nor is it signed other than the mimeographed names of A. Becker, president, and H. Hillary, secretary, at the end of the report.

Frustrated I am. Confused I am not. The author of the report, A. Becker, I imagine, thinks I have been a summer resident of Musselman's for only eight years. Our property and cottage, very modest, have been in our family for over 40 years. I knew what is now Valley Road when it was an unbroken meadow, the long grass blowing in waves of green before the late John Windsor would cut it, when, through the trees, Windsor Lake was a delicious spot of blue that disappeared and extended itself into a rushy pond teeming with life, a stone's throw from the bottom of our hill, steep, then white with daisies and bladder campion, before we planted our trees.

Mr. Becker doesn't understand how I could have "confused" the Whitchurch Conservation Club with the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority and the Holland Valley Conservation Authority. I didn't, not for a moment. I have already written to both Authorities, as well as the Water Resources Commission, the Minister of Municipal Affairs, York County Health Unit, to mention a few recipients. MTRCA told me Musselman's was not under their jurisdiction. The Holland Valley Conservation Authority said the situation was likely beyond their jurisdiction and promised to investigate and report. That was on August 10th, 1966. I haven't heard a word since. The York County Unit has never answered my letter with regard to conditions at a certain cottage even though I enclosed a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

Mr. Becker says my statement "Conservation in Whitchurch is 30 years late" is an understatement. He continues, "the foundations for undesirable housing development in part of the Lake Wilcox area, and in at least two other areas in Whitchurch Township were laid more than half a century ago, when there was no provincial or municipal legislation to prevent it." I agree, I agree! But what has Whitchurch done in the last 50 years? It didn't take them that long to assess what was happening. If a feeble attempt at conservation had been begun in the named areas 30 years ago, 20 years ago, the line might have been held, and at Musselman's dedicated drive NOW by conservationists or any level of government could save it from becoming a slum.

You say you have existed as a voluntary club for 20 years, that you have no authority or money to deal with matters of expropriation. No more have I. But you could at one time or another in the last 20 years have lifted your voice above a whisper to protest at what has and is happening at Wilcox and Musselman's. I have been writing letters to the papers for years about it. I never heard from you or of you. Don't you feel a sort of municipal shame that Wilcox and Musselman's rapidly becoming another Wilcox, both exist in Whitchurch, adjacent to a city whose population and recreational needs burgeon enormously every year?

Have you visited the affected parts of Musselman's lately? Do you know that the Township Council, the building inspector, the

clerk, the solicitor will not lift a finger to enforce the present by-law, or the old by-law, governing the use of cottages, that the official plan for the area around Musselman's drawn by Proctor and Redfern and paid for by the township is never used nor referred to. In a conversation on July 25th, 1966, T. Kerr, the township clerk told me he wished Musselman's would dry up? I can prove these statements. Let me show you.

Then Mr. Becker, you say, "unfortunately the people who clamour for more activity in conservation are the ones who bellyache and beef loudly when asked to pay even 25% of the cost through their municipal tax bills. I can't speak for all but are you saying that any responsible cottager would prefer to pay for schools, welfare, roads which they don't need, rather than for conservation? Try us."

I am glad Whitchurch Conservation Club has saved some poor animals from the guns of illegal hunters, glad that there is a Whitchurch Conservation area. I commend your other good works. But you are fiddling while Rome burns. Conservation ought to begin where it's most needed. Are you interested?
