## Third Candidate Enters Pickering Ward 2 Race

PICKERING — A new face will challenge the position of Ward 2 Councillor in Pickering Township's December election. Robert Mason, a 26 year old real estate appraiser-consultant residing at Pickering Beach will run against incumbent Donald Beer and George Hodgson.

With the redivision of the wards, Pickering Beach was added to the largely rural northern area of the former Ward 2 and has formed a split urban-rural ward.

Mason, a resident for nearly three years, said it was time that a new generation was elected to attempt to pull the township from its financial problems created by the older generation.

"I challenge any member of council to stand on his record. For the past 10 years every candidate for council has faithfully promised to bring industry into the township. As a result our ratio of industrial assessment to resi-

dential is now at 11-39, not a very successful promise," said Mason.

"The time wasted by this council is obvious to anyone who has ever attended one meeting of council," said Mason. "It is time we allotted more discussion time to priorities and less to frivolous matters."

"The present council policy of residential infilling is sure to increase taxes next year, we need a four point study of reorganizing the township boundaries," said Mason.

Robert Mason said the four point study would include consideration of leaving the existing boundaries, annexing Ajax and Pickering Village, splitting the township along the Third Concession without annexation and splitting the township with the southern area amalgamating with Ajax and Pickering Village.

Present Councillor Donald Beer has already said he would try to retain his

seat. Mr. Beer resides at Brougham and said that since his retirement he would be able to spend most of his time in the operation of the township. George Hodgson, 53, operator of Paulyne Park on Greenwood Road, said he would try again for the Ward 2 position of councillor. Mr. Hodgson said his park was open only four months a year and he would be able to give a great deal of time to the township.

Mr. Hodgson came out strongly against hunting in Pickering Township and said council should exercise its right to prohibit hunting. He said the township was also in great danger of becoming a dormitory for Metro Toronto.

Mr. Hodgson also said he favored increasing the assessment on homes with children to offset the cost of schooling. He said the township had allowed the Conservation Authority to buy too much land in the municipality and said

there was nothing to prevent the authority selling the land to a developer at a later date.

Mr. Hodgson was defeated by councillor Beer by a vote of 399 to 99 in the 1965 election.
