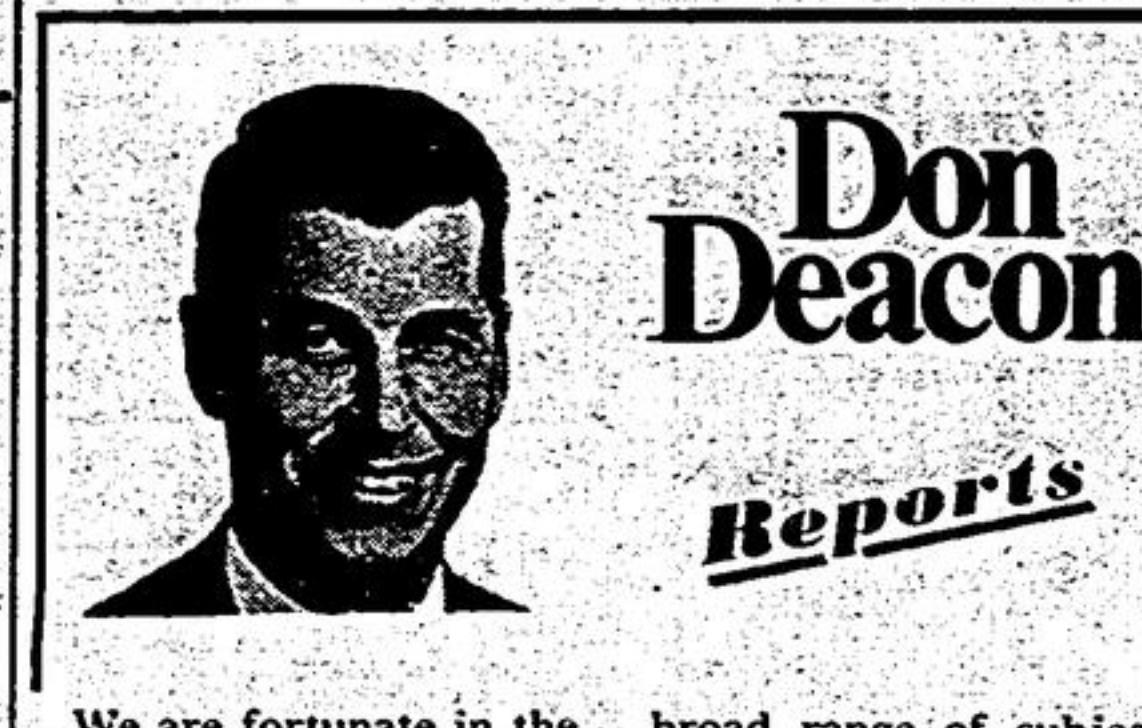

Don Deacon Reports We are fortunate in the riding of York Centre to have several excellent weekly newspapers which are widely read by the residents. I propose to write a monthly letter to each of these newspapers covering matters of general interest to the riding and of special interest to each area. Among the telegrams which arrived shortly after my election as the Member was one from Robert Nixon announcing that the first Liberal caucus would be held on Monday October 23 at 10:30 a.m. I was pleased to learn at the caucus meeting that the departments suggested for my specific attention as a Member of the Opposition are to be Financial and Commercial Affairs (Mr. Rowntree) and Municipal Affairs (formerly Mr. Spooner). I was shown the excellent Library and other facilities available for briefing ourselves on these and a broad range of subjects. During the next three months I plan to study legislation in the above two departments carefully particularly that section of Bill 81, dealing with Metro garbage disposal, which is so undemocratic and dangerous. The letters I have received to date from the residents of the riding indicate that commuter service heads the list of priorities for York Centre. Increased provincial share of education costs and the opening up of new service areas by the Ontario Water Resources Commission to ease the housing crisis are also objectives to be reached as soon as possible. I look forward to receiving constructive suggestions from residents and shall endeavour to keep you informed on some of the more important developments at Queen's Park which affect our riding.

Press Correspondent 15 Years

By JEAN LEAF It was fifteen years ago this week that the first Buttonville column written by your columnist was sent to The Liberal at Richmond Hill. Mrs. Walter Craig who had been the local reporter, returned to the teaching profession. And since she felt there were a few neighbourhood happenings in Halloween week - which should be chronicled, I agreed to send in a report for her. A few days later Sam Cook of The Liberal came to the Leaf household and asked if I would continue. I agreed with certain provisos. Later, Mel Williams of the Markham Economist and Sun asked for items and in 1955 The Tribune took a column also. In that first item, November 6, 1952: Cubs met at Brown's Corners Church with Aquila Elsie Hood and assistant Cub Mistress Doreen Jones (now Mrs. Gordon Vaughan) in charge. Bob and Mary Lou Hood and small daughter Debbie were tending store at Buttonville while Les Hood went hunting. Ken Stephenson had returned from a week's tour of stock and poultry farms in Indiana - a trip won in a Shur-Gain competition. Bruce Jones was playing Junior A hockey with the Porcupine 'Combines', a farm team for the Montreal Canadiens. Ann Davies was a student teacher at Buttonville School (then an eight grade little red school-house) and high school students were attending Toronto Symphony concerts on Tuesday evenings - Joanne Gray, Joe Easton, Wilbur Brumwell, David Boynton, Heather Burns and Lynda Leaf. Miss Frances Baker (Mrs. James Powell) was the teacher at Buttonville School, and Master Barry Kedwell was Master of Ceremonies at the Halloween party. Jacqueline Johnston, and Cynthia Easton read stories, and Sandra Burr (Mrs. Murray Carson) and Joy Fuller (Mrs. Reg Crawford) sang a duet. Costume prizes were won by Bobby Oakes and Bobby Wilkins. The Junior Farmers' were active as well. They conducted a service at Central United Church, Unionville, with Bill Clark in charge; Ellen Hooper (Mrs. Ted Gough) reading scripture and Ted Gough leading in prayer. The Davidson Mission Band held a Thankoffering meeting, with Beverley Burr (Mrs. Keith Carson) in the chair; Nancy Brown (Mrs. Jim Wolfe) as secretary; and Irene Watters pianist. Janet Craig and Jimmy Hood played piano solos, (the first time for each) and Mrs. Fred Leaf told a story. Miss Mary Rodick and Miss Ellen Boynton were leaders. And there was a community Halloween party sponsored by the Family Night committee of Brown's Corners Church. Aubrey Stephenson chaired proceedings, with assistance from Mr. and Mrs. Milt Sherman and Mr. and Mrs. Ross Hord (who were unable to be present). There were Imperial Oil films on Tractor Safety, Land of the Maharajas, and The Loon's Necklace, courtesy of Bill Hood, but evidently there was no projector in the community because the one used that evening was the property of the Agincourt Lions. Agincourt had costumes for a party - must - and Rev. and Mrs. A. C. Huston switched identities for the evening; Mrs. John Black and Pat Hood were winners in the grand parade; Beverley Burr won the class under 16 years with her hobo costume. Another item notes that television aeriels were sprouting from neighbourhood rooftops since CBLT went on the air in September. Two were erected the week previous at the homes of Miss Della Stephenson and the Floyd Culps (opposite Jones' store). Jim Wolfe and Howard Brumwell headed for the hills and a hunting expedition last weekend, and Bill Hood plans a trip also. Last Friday night saw many local people attending the Warden's Banquet at the King Edward Hotel - Mr. and Mrs. Vern Griffin, Mr. Harold Harper, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Craig, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hood, Mr. and Mrs. George Hooper, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Champion, Dr. and Mrs. George Kelly.

School Costs Below Average

BALLANTRAE - Per pupil education costs in the Township of Whitchurch are \$5 below the Provincial average in elementary school systems of the same size, Area Board Chairman, Dr. Morris Smith informed a meeting of the trustees, Monday night. In Whitchurch, in 1966, the cost per child was \$321.00. In Ontario, the cost was \$366.00. Dr. Smith said that figures had been published by the Ontario Association of Business Officials. The chairman pointed out that the Whitchurch Board could spend an additional \$65,000 at an extra mill rate of 2.27 and still keep within the per pupil rate for the province.

Gormley Church Anniversary

GORMLEY - Sunday, November 5, marked the 94th anniversary of the Gormley United Missionary Church. The first structure on the site, a small, frame building, was replaced in 1931 by the present basic red brick building. This building was, in turn, renovated and enlarged to almost twice the floor space two years ago. Present pastor of the congregation is Rev. L. K. Sider, who was originally in charge of the work from 1949-1952, and is now in his fifth year of a second tenure of pastorate. The 94th Anniversary is being marked by a revival series of meetings, with Rev. Hugh Jamieson, of the Faith Mission, Hamilton, in the capacity as evangelistic preacher. Services, that opened last Sunday, continue each evening through this week, including Saturday, and will conclude with the meetings of the next Sunday, Nov. 12 at 11 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.
