Mr. and Mrs. Bert Lickorish From Pen Pal Courtship To Golden Anniversary

STOUFFVILLE — Few couples are better known or more highly respected by their neighbors and many friends than Mr. and Mrs. Bert Lickorish, Main Street West, in Stouffville.

On Saturday Mr. and Mrs. Lickorish celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary and 36 attended a family dinner in their honor at the Veterans' Memorial Hall. On Sunday more than 130 gathered at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Lloyd Jennings, Rose Avenue, to offer their best wishes and congratulations.

From their childhood days it was obvious that they were made for each other. Both were born in Northamptonshire, England, and first met when Mrs. Lickorish, then Nellie Elizabeth Sturgess, went to visit an uncle in the home-village of her husband-to-be.

The two became close friends, but were soon separated by many ocean miles when Bert moved with his parents to Canada and settled near Unionville. They continued to correspond, however, and absence made their hearts grow even fonder.

War broke out in 1914 and it was indeed an ill wind that brought this couple some good. They were re-united on old England soil once more as Mr. Lickorish immediately answered the call to service. Their reunion was brief, however, since Bert's regiment was sent to France. Nellie never stopped writing.

In 1917, the two were married. Rev. W. H. Sharland performed the ceremony at St. Mary's Anglican Church in the tiny village of Rhodes. Acting as best man was the bride's uncle, Mr. Harry Sturgess, also on leave from the Army. He attended the anniversary gathering, Sunday.

There was no time for a honeymoon. Bert had only seven days' leave and it was back to the trenches in France. While there, he was wounded in action. He received the Military Medal for bravery.

At the conclusion of the war, Bert returned to Canada and his wife followed, five months later. They took up residence on his father's farm at Unionville, later moving to Markham and then, in 1932, to Stouffville. They became the proud parents of three daughters, Betty (Mrs. Ralph Parker) of Mimico; Mayben (Mrs. James Lee) of Markham and Beatrice (Mrs. Lloyd Jennings) of Stouffville.

For 28 years, Mr. Lickorish was employed with the Goldfish Supply Company until his retirement. At the family gathering, Saturday, a beautiful 3-tiered anniversary cake decorated with gold bells and a large gold '50', highlighted an attractive head table.
