Management Analysis Available To Farmers

Near the end of the year, and on days when the weather is bad, working on farm books is a useful activity. Records are needed for tax purposes but even more important, to assess the farm business to see how well it is doing.

A good system is needed, and if a new one is being started, the first of the year is by far the best time to make the change. Records of cash receipts and expenses by themselves aren't much help. They may be alright for some businesses but records have to be a lot more complete for farming. Changes in livestock numbers, supplies on hand, value of equipment, and depreciation, just have to be accounted for if the final figure is going to be more accurate.

Measure of Management. The best measure of management on a farm is possible with an analysis of financial and other records. Things like livestock performance, crop yields, labor use, capital use and size of business can be rated by comparing them to set standards. This analysis is available to anyone in York County.

It's done by bringing a completed Farm Account book to our office at Newmarket. We will take the information from it, and send it to the University of Guelph. It goes into a computer there, which will work out the various management factors. This is a good service, and we can provide it for

anyone after the New Year.

Crop Improvement. Most of the arrangements have been made now for the annual meeting of the York Crop Improvement Association. It will be held at Victoria Square this year, on Tuesday, January 9.

The television program on dairy farming will be featured on the morning program. This is a good date to keep open.

Feed Prices Likely Up

A seasonal rise in feed prices in Ontario is expected within the next six months because of a high demand both here and in the United States, according to Professor J. H. Clark, Department of Agricultural Economics, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

Although prices are low at the present time, several factors indicate an increase. Because of the importance and size of the U.S. corn crop, actions taken there have a direct effect on Canadian prices.

Demand for feed on the continent this year will be high since a relatively large number of livestock are on feed. This will be the case despite the fact that yields were higher than expected in both Canada and the United States.

The impending decision by the U.S. Government about acreage allotments for next year will have an effect on the price rise. If allotments are increased, price rise increases next year will be minimized but a reduction in allotments would strengthen prices. Already the government has announced reductions in wheat allotments. It is likely that similar reasoning will prevail for feed grains.

The decision on acreage allotments is considerably influenced by the fact that 1968 is an election year in the United States. All the prices of Canadian feed grains generally follow along with price changes in the United States so it is expected that the increases there will be felt here in Ontario.
