The Juvenile Club is enjoying an excellent season but costs of operations are much in excess of receipts at the gate.

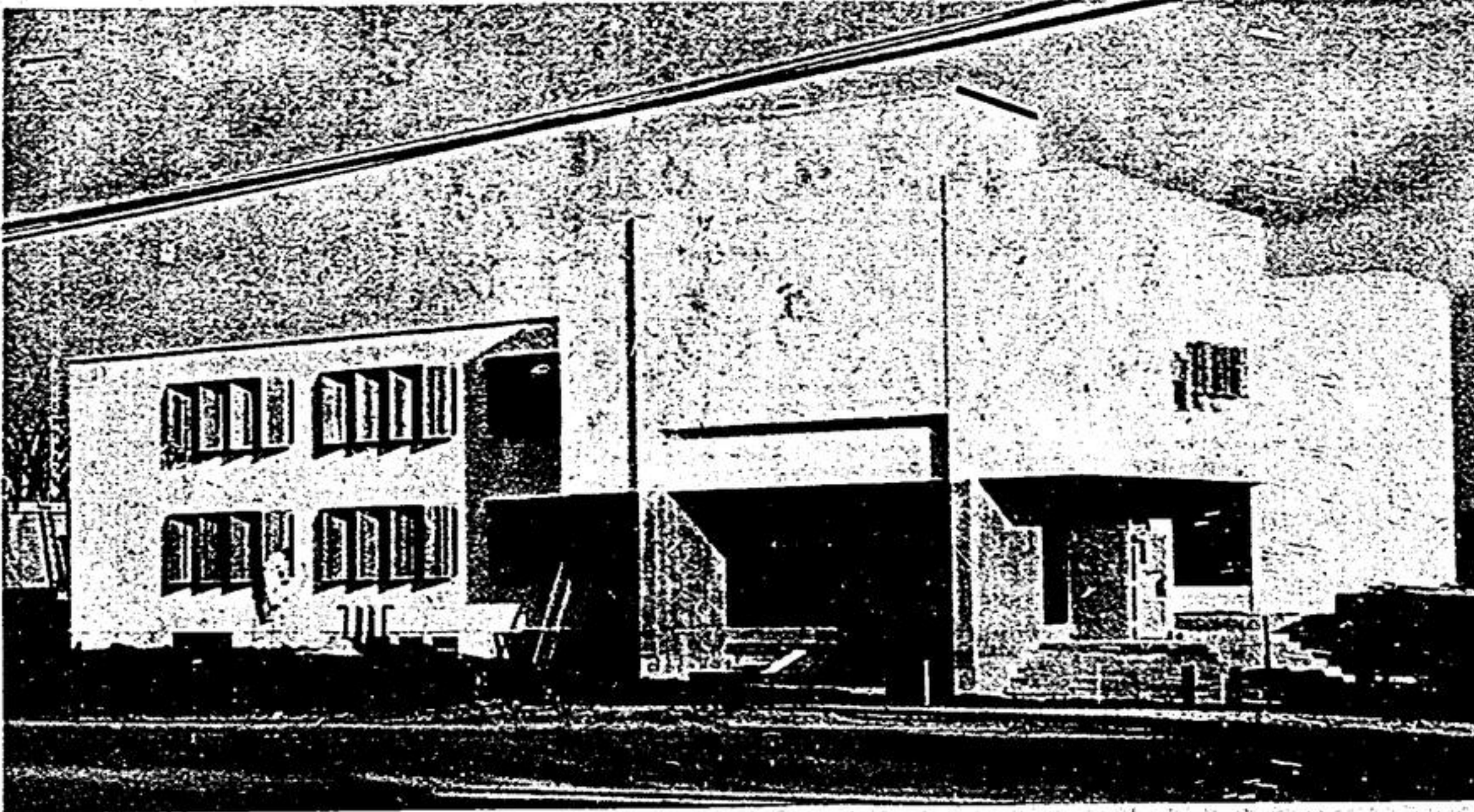
