Jailed Thirty Days

STOUFFVILLE — A Stouffville motorist, involved in an accident, March 28, that killed a two year old Burkholder Street boy was sent to jail for 30 days following a conviction, Friday in Magistrate's Court, Richmond Hill. Arnold Harper, William Street, was the driver of an eastbound car that struck down Wayne Jollymore, as he crossed Main Street with his mother. The little lad died four hours later in hospital. Harper was later charged with driving while impaired. He entered a plea of not guilty. Testimony in the case was provided by the investigating officer, P.C. Thomas Wauchope of Stouffville and two eye witnesses, John Illingworth, Hawthorne Avenue and his son, Tony. Constable Wauchope said that the accused's eyes were bloodshot and his breath smelled of alcohol. He noted too, that he was unsteady on his feet, both at the scene and in the police office. "Drinking and driving just don't mix," commented Magistrate Russell Pearce, "too many people are killed through this sort of thing." In addition to the jail term, Harper's licence will be suspended for one year.

Pickering Permits

First Come, First Served Basis

PICKERING — The new Pickering Township Council meant business when it endorsed the Ontario Municipal Board ruling that only 100 building permits would be issued in 1968. This is to be the beginning of a more equitable industrial to residential ratio and council proposes to develop the first and limit the second. A resolution was passed at the inaugural meeting of council on Monday night to establish the building permit policy for this year, and permits will be issued as follows: Developer and builder, 35 permits; rural clusters, existing lots, and any new consents, 35 permits; rural farm, 5 permits, and a reserve of 25 permits. This adds up to the meagre 100 residential buildings that will be allowed to be erected this year. Of vital importance to Consolidate Building Corporation, this ultimatum was discussed by Mr. Campbell, who wondered what would become of the 87 family dwellings proposed to complete its development. Mr. Campbell reminded council that there were two registered plans by C.B.C. recently registered and all services had been completed in order to obtain building permits. "Are these 87 part of the 100?" he asked. Reeve John Williams told Mr. Campbell and others wishing to obtain building permits to submit immediately to this council an estimate of their anticipated requirements. Council will receive a monthly report of the permits issued, and will adjust allocations as it sees fit. And council will be the sole judge of what is reasonable and fair, on a first come, first served basis. The facts of the resolution passed will be advertised this month. It expires December 31st, or if replaced by a new resolution. Councillor John Kruger said the taxable percent was 14.4 in 1966, and in 1967, and in 1967 something around 30 per cent. "This is due to rapid development," he said, "if you don't have a balance of industrial, then somebody has to be the residential taxpayers." He said the tax rate was 58.2 per cent higher in 1967 than in 1962. "This has to stop," he said. Councillor Victor Rudi-k said council was anxious to have as few people as possible injured by this action. "I don't believe we can implement this without someone being hurt," he said.
