Agricultural Committee Be Formed

PICKERING — A very young lady was granted a handshake — and a kiss by the new reeve John Williams at the inaugural meeting of Pickering Township.

Miss Diane Williams presented her father with a gavel to maintain order at his 1968-69 council meetings, wished him and all the other councillors well in their terms of office.

After the reeve had taken his oath of office, and the other councillors had

done the same in unison, three members of Pickering Township's clergy sent council off to a good start.

Inaugural Address
In his inaugural address reeve John Williams said he was looking forward to two years of hard and productive work.

"The individuals elected by you," he said, "deserve and will require the support by every resident in the Township, for these are not easy times."

He said he believed that now there was a chance

to increase the industrial and limit the residential ratio.

A brief will be presented outlining Pickering's problems in the hope of securing provincial and possibly federal assistance, he said. By-Laws will be amended and renewed.

The official plan would be implemented, the completion of the water expansion program is a must, the industrial area will be well under way this spring, council will work toward the trend to

regional government.

One of the reeve's suggestions was to form an agricultural committee which will meet regularly and bring problems in this realm to the attention of council.
