Community Centre Costs Still Climbing

BALLANTRAE - It's one thing to establish a Community Centre and another thing to operate it. The cold hard facts of costs were outlined before Whitchurch Twp. Council by Kim Rogers, at a meeting Jan. 23.

Mr. Rogers estimated that a budget of \$7,000 would be required to maintain the Centre in 1968. He asked for immediate payment of \$3,628.00 to cover current expenditures and winterize the building. Mr. Rogers said that approval of the project had been granted by the Council of 1967 and he felt that the work should be completed.

It was agreed that the money-should be forwarded to the Secretary of the Board in three separate instalments.

Councillor Bob Lewis noted that a one-month bill for heating the Centre totalled \$245. He felt that this was extremely high. Mr. Rogers explained that 'this cost could be reduced through proper insulation.

Councillor Norman Barnard questioned why the former Council had not set aside sufficient funds points. in their budget to cover all expenditures. Reeve Stewart Burnett explained that when funds for 1967 were approved, the Council was assured by the Centennial Committee that they would not require additi-
