## Congregation 'A Lynch Mob' Pastor

SANDFORD — Rev. Russell Horsburgh has likened a group of members within the congregation of Chatham United Church, to a "lynch mob" who were out to get him.

Mr. Horsburgh addressed the men's club of the Sandford-Mt. Albert, United churches, Jan. 16. Two days later, he was acquitted of all charges of contributing to juvenile delinquency, laid in 1964.

Mr. Horsburgh told the group that he was convicted of a crime he did not commit, because of "bigots" within the church and likened himself to other church martyrs who have suffered for their beliefs. He spent 104 days in jail. The new trial was ordered by the Supreme Court of Canada.

Mr. Horsburgh said he had endeavoured to make his ministry relevant to present day needs. He criticized other churches for being "theology bound." He said his philosophy led to a disagreement with certain members of his congregation and his subsequent trouble. "A minister and a congregation must join hands to meet the needs of a community," he said.

church has something to do with theology but nothing whatever to do with life today," he continued. He charged that the main goal of the church should be to accomplish something in the field of human relations.

Mr. Horsburgh contended that the power of the church had waned because it indulged in practices that held no interest for the average individual. "It's lost its relevance in terms of creed. Some have been disproved by science and some are just outdated," he said. "The
