Rural Pickering Charged For Police Building Site

PICKERING — The purchase price of the land for the new Pickering Township Police building, \$4,218.75, will be charged to the 1967 general fund.

In the first dissenting vote of the year, north ward councillors Victor Rudik and Donald Beer recorded their opposition to this.

Pickering Township police operates in the south part of the township. The north part is policed by the O.P.P.

Mr. Rudik remarked that there is a definite split between urban and rural, and he couldn't see too much justification for asking to total cost across the whole municipality.

"I think it's unfair," he said, "although they do get a small benefit from radio communications for fire calls."

Mr. Beer agreed, and said that the principle of charging this across the north part, when it got no benefit from it, was wrong.

"I consider this to be an asset to the Corporation," said Councillor John Kruger, "and as such, any benefits therefrom must accrue to all the people. You cannot equate the use of that item because somebody doesn't use it."

Mr. Kruger agreed that there is an emotional consideration, but said, "If we are going to take over every single asset and say this is for me and this is for you, we would get nowhere."

Councillor Donald Kitchen said that if and when this land happened to be sold, the monies coming from the sale would not go to just one area.

"We are not asking the people in the north to pay for wages or salaries," said Councillor Arthur King. "This is a piece of property owned by the whole township. I cannot understand how they can complain about the municipality purchasing and holding a police property."

Reeve John Williams recalled the purchase of land at No. 2 highway and Liverpool Road "for the purchase of a new police station and fire hall." This was sold at quite a large profit, and the funds received from it went into the general fund.

Clerk Douglas Plitz, on being asked what the land was purchased for, replied "for municipal purposes."

Rudik had the last word. "We are talking about a principle," he said.

Adopt Rural Area Policy

PICKERING — In an effort to discourage residential development in Pickering Township, a rural area policy has been established.

Many applications before the committee of adjustment have been deferred awaiting the council's new policy.

No variance applications will be approved, the results of which would start a new residence. Councillor Victor Rudik cited an example: If a man unwittingly bought a lot under ten acres without the required frontage, his application would not be approved.

Consents will only be considered for hamlets, or clusters. Mr. Rudik named Claremont, Brougham, Green River, Greenwood, Green Road, Altona and other specific urban areas.

Only 50 residential lots will be accepted. This is subject to review after a trial period.

Each deferred application will be considered separately by the committee of adjustment on its merit. On parcels of ten acres or over, the committee has no control.
