What was the winter like back in 1918. It was one of the worst for snow, recalled Mr. Fairles. For one entire week, not a single train travelled the line between Toronto and Stouffville. On their wedding day it was quite mild and foggy.

For two years following their marriage, they lived on the home farm at Bloomington, then moved to their present residence on the Uxbridge-Whitchurch townline.

Through the years, both Mr. and Mrs. Fairles have been active members of the Stouffville United Church and still attend service there.

The kitchen of their cozy farm home showed visible signs of the many friendships built up over the years, in the form of dozens of beautiful anniversary cards. Some were from a distance but most from the immediate area where they have lived all their married life. "Yes, friends are wonderful," agreed Mrs. Fairles, checking through the names again. From the mail, it was obvious, they had their share.
