Approve plebiscite

Extend voting privilege

PICKERING — A question will be on the Pickering Township ballot at the next election: "Are you in favor of extending the vote to all persons over 21 who are British subjects by birth or naturalization?"

Victor Rudik, who proposed the motion said that only owners or tenants were entitled to vote, while men and women over 21 who still lived at home, or boarded, were not.

"I can't help but wonder about the people who live here, pay taxes, but have no vote because they are not citizens," said Councillor Arthur King.

"Sometimes," said Councillor John Kruger, "the husband who pays the taxes cannot vote, while the wife, who is a British subject, is entitled to vote."

"It is a privilege to be a Canadian," said Councillor Don Kitchen, "and I don't believe it should be extended to people who are not citizens."

"Perhaps we should do the same with taxes," was King's reply.

Council refuses to act on anti-police charges

PICKERING — Charges of police harassment and discrimination were contained in a letter from a Pickering township resident and aired at a meeting of the Pickering township council.

Reeve John Williams read aloud a letter from W. Glen How, lawyer for Charles S. Morton, who claimed several instances of harassment by the Pickering township police. Mr. How claimed that:

—a charge of assault had been laid against his client and later withdrawn.

—a charge of possessing stolen goods had been laid against his client without any good reason.

—Mr. Morton had been stopped by police "at least 30 times" for spot license and registration checks, and no charges were ever laid.

—Officers, when stopping him, refused to give their names. However, Mr. Morton identified some of the officers who stopped him as Constables Box, Fleming, Daniels and Goodman.

—Mr. Morton's car insurance had been mysteriously cancelled, at the instigation of Pickering township police. A police

officer stopped his car, took his insurance papers and radioed information from them to headquarters. No charge was laid, but a few weeks later the insurance policy was cancelled.

"After reading the letter, Reeve Williams said: "There are obvious misstatements of fact in that letter . . . omissions of rather large significance."

He pointed out that the charge of assault laid against Mr. Morton had been withdrawn at the request of the crown. The assault had been against his own daughter, and the letter claimed Mr. Morton had simply "disciplined" her. However, Reeve Williams said the only reason the crown withdrew the charge was that Mr. Morton agreed to surrender his daughter to the Children's Aid Society.

The Children's Aid Society in Oshawa confirmed Mr. Morton's daughter had been removed from the home after the charge of assault was dropped.

Deputy-chief Richard Bodley of the Pickering township police department said of the insurance cancellation, "That has nothing to do with us. There is no way a police department can cancel anyone's policy." He added that "Our men are not harassing him and never have."

"Any interference in this matter by this council," Councillor John Kruger said at the meeting last night, "would not be in the best interests of justice."

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Industrial assistance refused

PICKERING — Reeve John Williams has received a letter from the Industrial Development Corporation for industrial assistance has been reviewed, and again refused.

"The Committee came to the unanimous conclusion that it could not reverse its decision," the letter read.

They would, it said, consider making repayable loans to companies wishing to settle in the township.

At the same time a letter was received from W. G. Newman, M.P.P., who said that he wholeheartedly supported the application and had asked that it be reconsidered.
