## Whitchurch school site

### Receives department approval

**BALLANTRAE** — The Board of Trustees of TSA Whitchurch has purchased a 17 acre property in the centre of the township, on the north west corner of the 5th line and the Bloomington sideroad, for the purpose of building a 15 or 16 room Kindergarten to Grade 8 school. Approval for this choice of site and school type has been obtained from the Township Council, from the Consultative Committee of York County and from officials of the Department of Education.

A Barrie firm of architects, Salter and Allison has been commissioned to design a modern "open" type school featuring large rooms which will house three or more teaching areas. Demountable or folding walls will be incorporated so that the three areas can be combined or separated at will, thus providing flexibility in the future educational programming.

The Board hopes to see the school built by next fall so that temporary classrooms in portables at Vandorf school and in the basements of certain other schools can be abandoned as soon as possible. Some of the present 2-room schools will be closed but the decision will be deferred until the organization of the larger County Board of Education, which is supposed to come into force next year. It is anticipated however, that certain smaller schools will be useful for Kindergarten and possibly in some cases for primary grades.

Arrangements have been made by the Whitchurch Board to sell by Public Tender the property on the north west corner of the 7th line and the Vandorf sideroad, purchased by the preceding Board for a Senior Public School site. Since neither the site or this type of school was approved by the Township Council, the County, or the Department of Education, the plan had to be cancelled by the new 1968 Board.

Preliminary indications are that under the proposed County Educational system, Senior public school facilities (grades 7 and 8) in adjacent towns will serve the rural areas, a move which would provide the economy of integrated bussing with the Secondary School systems.

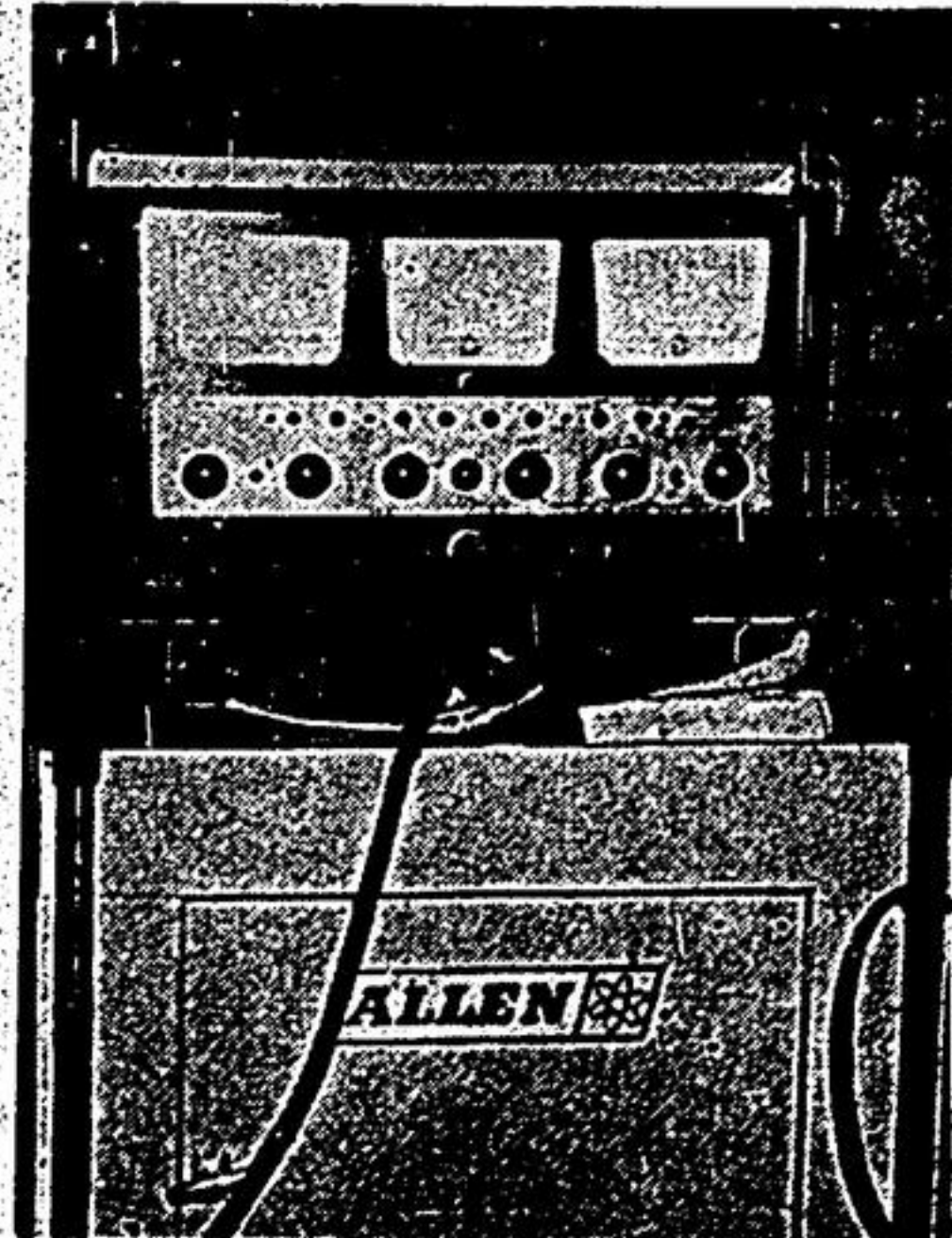
