In her books, it was found that she had maintained records of every purchase. It was revealed too, that students were receiving hamburgers more than once a week, also french fries and cheeseburgers. This was apparently not to the supervisor's liking and therefore shouldn't be to our liking either. Ketchup, that had been made available, was absolutely forbidden and candies that once sold for five cents, have now been increased to six.

The cook, who plans and prepares the meals, had, according to our information, been promised an increase in salary. We have now learned, through The Tribune, that applications are being received for a new manager and cook although the present employee was never notified of any intended change.

A petition has been started protesting this kind of treatment. Already, it has received more than 200 signatures. For what she has done for us, this is the least we can do for her.

There is serious talk of boycotting the cafeteria if our demands are not met.
