# Whitchurch welfare \$115,000 in 9 months

WHITCHURCH TWP. -From May 1, 1967, to Jan. 31, 1968, a period of nine months, welfare payments in the Township of Whitchurch exceeded \$115,000, Clerk Thomas Kerr revealed to members of council. The smallest account for a single month was in June at just over \$10,000. In December, it rose to \$16,000.

Fortunately, the municipality where the welfare recipients' reside, is required to pay only a small

portion of the total cost. Eighty percent is subsidized by the government.

Deputy-reeve Lawrence Hennessey objected to the presentation of welfare accounts that extended

back nine months, particularly when he and the majority of members did not serve on the council of 1967. He recommended that in future, accounts of this kind be submitted for approval on a monthly
