In private life - "when one has family responsibilities certain ambitions must become secondary" - Reeves is unit manager with the CBC. Here again, his work with schedules, production and budgets stand him good stead.

"Quiet Weekend", a play written by E. Mc-Cracken, is the third effort of the Markham Little Theatre, Previously the company had staged "Gaslight" which also was received enthusiastically.

"We had the largest cast in Weekend with thirteen characterizations," said Lawrence Moule, one of the members. "I think it was our best effort too," he said.
