Mr. Booth, the son of Charles and Fanny Booth, was born in Scarborough where his parents operated a farm. It was March 27, 1918 when Rev. H. D. Cameron performed the wedding ceremony at the bride's home. Rev. Cameron was the pastor of Melville Presbyterian Church in Toronto. They left on a brief but rather exciting four-day honeymoon trip to Toronto, not by horse

and buggy but in a Studebaker car, a rather modern means of travel in those days. In 1929, Mr. and Mrs. Booth moved to their present place on 14th Avenue and became known as one of the best market gardeners in the business. Their produce was a household word with Toronto customers. The couple speak with pride of their one daughter, Mrs. Elsie Mashinter of Richmond Hill and their five grandchildren. Although supposedly retired, they both enjoy keeping busy. Their greenhouse is a kind of hobby

and the famous lemon tree within has been publicized across the country. Mr. and Mrs. Booth have always had a fondness for children and kiddies, regardless of age are always made welcome at their home. This, in part, has helped to keep them young at heart. Among the many messages of good wishes was a telegram from Premier John Roberts.
