Dogs Running at Large

By-Law No. 796 of the Village of Stouffville provides that: "No dog shall be allowed to run at large at any time and all dogs found running at large, contrary to this by-law, in a highway or other public place within the Village of Stouffville, unless under the control of some person, may be seized and killed, either before or after impounding, or sold after impounding unless the dog is claimed within five days and all costs incurred paid."

"Any person who contravenes this By-Law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50)." 1968 DOG TAGS

"The owner of every dog shall procure a tag for each dog owned by him before May 1st each year." Tags may be obtained at the Clerk's Office.

Owners are subject to a penalty not exceeding \$10.00 if this section of the By-Law is not complied with

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


PLANS ARE NOW FINALIZED ...
